A Shift From Grants To Loans Changes Student Life

(CPS) -- Eight years after they rode into Washington, D.C., pledging to change federal student aid forever, members of the Reagan administration can say they succeeded. In their wake, they're leaving students who generally have to borrow aid money they used to get as grants.

Virtually all observers -- whether conservative or liberal -- say the dramatic shift in financial aid programs from grants to loans probably is the administration's most enduring campus accomplishment.

"Debt," said Fred Azcarate, president of the U.S. Student Association (USSA) in Washington, D.C., "is the great legacy of the Reagan administration for students."

Still others are disappointed the trend away from grants wasn't faster.

"The intent of financial aid was to supplement the cost (of a college education)," contended Jeanne Allen of the Heritage Foundation, a conservative think tank that helped develop many of the administration's campus policies.

President Reagan came into office with other education goals, too, like abolishing the Department of Education, shifting the responsibility for funding campuses from Washington to the states and, of course, drastically cutting the federal budgets for schools and colleges.

But "the announced intention to decrease expenditures. . . never materialized," noted Terrel Bell, Reagan's first education secretary.

It wasn't for lack of trying. In his first to budget proposals and again in 1987, the president tried to cut some major programs by as much as half.

"They wanted to do away with student aid," asserted Rick Jerue, staff director of the House Postsecondary Education Subcommittee. "Things would have been far worse if Congress had not opposed the Reagan administration on cuts."

Most direct aid to campuses for libraries and housing were in fact abolished, as were aid programs like student Social Security and the Middle Income Student Assistance Act.

The shift from grants--which students don't have to repay--to loans was probably the most significant and longlasting byproduct.

"The shift from grants to loans was not a fluke," said Gwendolyn L. Lewis of the College Board. "It will probably continue. We're not likely to see a shift (back to grants) in the future."

In the mid-1970's, Lewis said, 80 percent of the federal aid given to students was in the form of grants. By 1987-88, it was down to 47 percent.

C. Ronald Kimberling, who served in the Education Dept. under Reagan, blamed Jimmy Carter. "The most astronomical growth in loans came in the Carter administration," he said, adding the government loaned \$7.8 billion to students in 1981, up from \$1.9 billion in 1978.

However, the amount of money granted to students also rose during the same period. Much of the increased loan money was given to middle-class

students, who had been made eligible for student loans for the first time.

Student life, regardless of who started the shift to loans, has been changed as a result.

Liberal arts students, for example, changed their majors from lower-paying careers like teaching to more lucrative fields because they knew they'd need to repay loans, some said.

"Students know they are going to graduate with large debt, and that affects what classes they pick, what majors they choose, what jobs they select when they graduate," claimed Arlette Slachmuylder, president of the State Student Association of New York.

"It creates a lot of pressure on the student that hasn't existed in the past," he added.

USSA's Azcarate charged, "Some students will be in debt for the rest of their lives. Many young people are not going to college because they can't assume the debts."

And many who do choose to assume those debts now can't pay them back, critics said.

Just covering defaulted loans costs Washington \$1.6 billion a year, up from \$530 million in 1983 and about half the total it spends on Stafford Loans (formerly called Guaranteed Student Loans).

Former Secretary Bell said "the response of the higher education community and Congress frustrated" the administration's hopes to cut college spending more, and some Reagan critics remain bitter about it.

"We've been forced (to fight) to hold the status quo," Azcarate said. "I'd rather work on issues such as the retention and recruitment of minorities instead of defending programs that have existed for years." ¶

purposes. In past weeks several students have shared their mild frustrations with unrepaired desk lamps and light fixtures that seemingly go unattended to for weeks on end. That's going to change. Just this week Maintenance fixed both my desk lamp and stopped up bathtub. Understanding that there has been a lack of promptness in responding to student requests, it is now true that steps are being taken to rectify the situation which demands of us, the students, to be patient and realize efficiency will come but not overnight. Art Hall stated, "This college is deserving of good maintenance and that is what I am here to do. I compliment Dr. Adams and Dr. White--they were sensitive enough to the needs of the college to bring about change to reestablish the rapport between the students and maintenance."

Art Hall came to us from his year assignment as Coordinating Manager of Health Care Services at Hillside Hospital in Pulaski, TN. He is more closely associated with Georgia, his homestate, and with Crisp County Hospital where he was manager of Health Care Services for six years. Employed as a clinical

engineer by ServiceMaster, he expects Trevecca to be a permanent assignment until the rapture occurs. When questioning Art Hall about his background he began with happy emotion, "I am first of all a Christian..." Art Hall is of nondenominational affiliation. He is married with four children and five grandchildren. Art Hall has a graduate degree from the Institute of Technology, but his main education is documented under the Air Force.

STUDENT SUES FOR AIDS DISCRIMINATION

(CPS) -- A student kept out of dental school because he tested positive for the AIDS virus has sued Washington University of St. Louis for \$3 million in damages.

David Bensinger, dean of Washington's dental school, dismissed the student -- referred to in the suit as John Doe -- in August after finding out the student had tested positive for AIDS antibodies in March or April, 1988, but had gone on to treat 27 patients at the campus clinic as part of his studies anyway.

AIDS (aquired immune deficiency syndrome), of course, is a fatal virus spread through the exchange of bodily fluids like blood and saliva, which occur often in dentistry.

Bur Norman London, the dismissed student's attorney, argued in the lawsuit filed in December that his client legally is handicapped, and that the dental school's action amounted to discriminating against a disabled person.

While campus officials refused to comment on the

than 100 signatures on a petition to protest a proposal to install a condom machine in a campus dormitory.

The students said the machine will promote sexual promiscuity and increase students' risk of getting AIDS.

"Condoms won't solve these problems," said Sheila Barker, one of the students leading the petition drive. "These problems are on the rise because some people don't have any morals."

Placing condoms in campus bathrooms could damage Grand Valley State University's reputation, contended Senator Brian Sayers at a recent Senate debate about the machines at the Michigan campus.

"I don't want condom machines in my bathroom," said another Grand Valley student. "What will my parents and grandparents think when they come to visit?"

The student senate at Appalachian State University, however, voted to install condom machines in residence halls this term, mak-

suit, school lawyer Peter Ruger contended they were well within their rights to dismiss the student in the name of protecting others from the virus.

Protection efforts, meanwhile, provoked arguments about morals at other schools:

Arizona State University dissidents collected more

ing ASU the first university in North Carolina to do so.

"There was a lot of concern of the moral issue of the bill, but with the amount of unwanted pregnancy, this bill's effects will serve as a prevention method," said Jenny Novak, the bill's sponsor. "The student government in no way condones promiscuity. We're just concerned about students." ☪

NEW BILL REQUIRES MILITARY OR VOLUNTEER WORK FOR FINANCIAL AID RECIPIENTS

(CPS) -- Students would have to join the military or do volunteer work to get financial aid if a new bill introduced Jan. 6 becomes law.

As expected, Sen. Sam Nunn (D-Ga.) and Rep. Dave McCurdy (D-Okla.) said they'd introduce legislation that would phase out all federal student aid programs within five years, replacing them with a deal in which students would have to perform some

kind of "national service" in return for aid.

McCurdy, in announcing the measure, said it would enforce the notion that "democracy is not free."

If the plan passes -- both legislators expected Congress to vote on it by early 1990 -- students would have to serve one year in a public service civilian job like working in a nursing home or hospital or two years in a combat branch of the military.

Students who served in the military would get a \$25,000 grant at the end of their hitch.

Students who worked in civilian jobs would get a \$10,000 grant.

McCurdy hoped the plan would "reinvigorate citizenship" as an ideal that was first severely damaged during the Vietnam war. Then "the 1970s and early 1980s featured 'me generations' more interested in their own financial gain and getting BMWs than serving their country." ☪

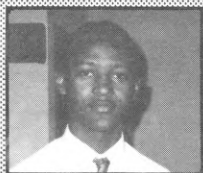

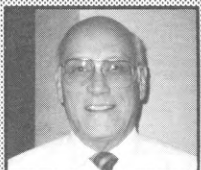

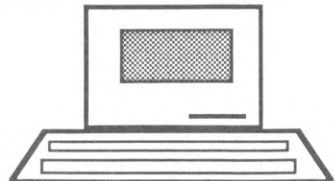

PA PROGRAM REVEALED

"We consider ourselves a pretty unusual group of people," Scot Hill, Physician Assistant student, said.

Physician Assistants (PAs) are those "who are the member of a health care team and works independantly under the supervision of a licensed physician," according to the pamphlet "Physician Assistants: PArtners in Health Care".

There are a total of 20 students that range from ages twenty to fourty-eight. Half of the married students have kids. Only one student lives in the dormitory, the rest live off-campus or in the married student apartments," Hill said.

According to the students the average weekday begins at 4:00 a.m., for early morning preparation of classes - which start at 7:30 a.m. and dismiss at 3:00 p.m.

All Physician Assistant (PA) classes are held in the same room (BS 311) throughout the day Monday through Friday.

When classes are dismissed the students make their rounds of assigned patients at the Trevecca Health Care Center. After which, they go to work or head home to study. The average PA student doesn't get to bed until midnight or later.

"Each semester we take the equivalent of 24 class hours," said Elizabeth Beebe, student representative to the Tennessee Academy of Physician Assistants (TAPA) from Trevecca's PA program.

"A lot of students don't know that Trevecca has a PA program or what a PA is," Gail Mercer, President of Trevecca's PA Association, said.

"I was a Biology/Pre-Med major and didn't know what I qanted to do. I didn't want to be a nurse or a doctor. Then I met someone in the PA program," Mercer said.

"Not just anybody can enter the PA program," Mercer added.

As stated in a handout of the Physician Assistant Program at TNC, the entrance requirements include "two years of college work and all science course prerequisites and general education requirements (are) completed."

Before admisssion "the

program places strong emphasis on applicants having had health care experience with direct patient contact, "the handout stated.

According to the PA students, several already had their Associate Degree before acceptance into the program. And a majority of the class already had a background in the medical profession.

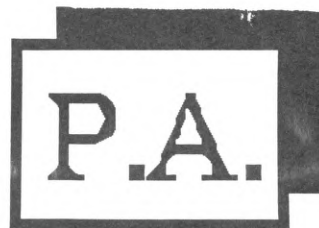
"Trevecca has the only PA program in the state and the only Christian one in the country," Hill said.

"It's a very high pressure, high stress program," Elizabeth Beebe, student representative, said.

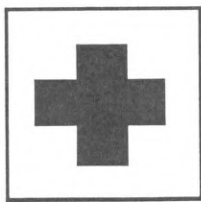
"We can't fail more than two classes. After that we're out of the program," Beebe added.

The Physician Assistant students included that the whole program is two years long, which runs thru both summers.

"The nurse is wonderful! She 'mothers' you and makes you feel so much better when you're feeling sick," said Micki McCloud, TNC student waiting to be cared for in the clinic.

Trevecca is proud of its clinic which serves its students and their families, faculty and staff.

The clinic is situated behind Georgia Hall on the basement level.

With limited hours in the summertime, the clinic is open yearround, from 8:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. to service Trevecca.

A staff of three well qualified people keep the clinic working in great condition. They are Jo Ann Hendershot, Wilma Gallup and Dr. G. Michael Moredock.

Jo Ann Hendershot serves as the receptionist. She is also a dorm mother in Johnson Hall and has previous nursing experience.

The nurse, Wilma Gallup, has worked 14 years in the clinic, nine of which she

worked on call. She is responsible for doing a triage or designation of treatment to patients.

If a patient is extremely ill or has an illness which requires a doctor's attention the patient is referred to Dr. G. Michael Moredock, the clinic doctor.

Dr. Moredock is also head of the Allied Health Department at Trevecca.

According to Nurse Gallup, the professional atmosphere of the clinic includes a very high confidentiality policy between the patient and the clinic.

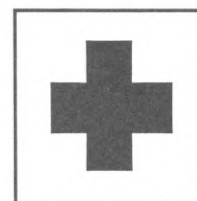
Concerning the low cost of medical care, the clinic uses generic drugs which contain the same ingredients as the expensive ones. Also, the clinic is non-profitable and the workers are hired by Trevecca as a service.

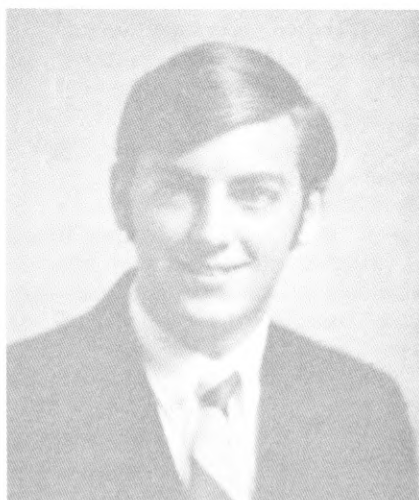

While in high school Danny was a member of the Honor Society,



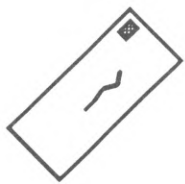

Dear Editor

Last year on this campus there was a game going on that was sponsored solely by the participants of the game. The name of the game was "Assassination." Participants would "assassinate" other participants using water guns or rubber dart guns. The victim was then eliminated from the game . . . pretty harmless, huh?

There was and is another "game" going around campus today, sponsored solely by the participants of the game. This game is bit more deadly, for the participants do not use water or darts--but words, and names (sometimes called labels). The name of this "game" is called "character assassination", and in this game the person who is being "assassinated" doesn't even have to be present (in fact, in most cases, the victim isn't present). The only thing that has to happen is for the person to be referred to in such a way as to tear down his/her character or reputation.

I vividly remember one such example. I was outside

Benson dorm when I heard members of a particular service club making fun of a friend of mine. I said, "I think (name withheld) is a pretty nice guy--don't you? Without hesitation, the answer came back, "I think (name again withheld) is a wienie." This person did not know my friend very well, for I talked to my friend about it, but he went on what he thought he knew, and since he was with his friends, he found it safe and convenient (perhaps even funny) to slander the name of my friend.

In the assassination game I was in last year, friendships were made, for you had to know the person whom you were trying to shoot, and once the game was over, it was easy to talk and to laugh about it with others who were in the game. In "character assassination," however, friendships are not made but destroyed, aborted; for this "game" does not pull people together, but it pushes them further apart. It doesn't make them part of a community, but rather it isolates them.

I would like to say that the only participants of this game are students, but the truth is that I have heard faculty members and (GASP!) administration playing the game. I have to come to believe that the primary objective of this game is: Make self look or feel better at the expense of another. In this game there are no winners--only losers. I don't think Christ would approve of such a game, because I don't think Christ approves of such behavior. To my shame I admit that I have been actively involved in slamming the name of another, simply because I found it easy and convenient to do so, and I knew the people with whom I was talking would more than likely agree. I hope it won't sound too self-righteous to say that I have repented of this/these evil(s), and since there can be no repentance unless there is also change, I am continually striving to, as the Psalmist said, "Let the words of my mouth, and the meditations of my heart be acceptable in thy sight--Oh Lord, my Strength and my Redeemer."

band that looks straight from 1972, a lead singer who looks like a hip Amy Grant (with some heavy Carole King influences), and a great song with lyrics like "Philosophy is a walk on slippery rocks, religion is a light in the fog," -- an album with all this going for it has got to be great, right? tracks, Shooting Rubber Bands at the Stars can be summed up as the album that almost was.

There are of course, highlights. "Love Like We Do" is a memorable, happy look at a relationship; "Circle" is a very melancholy piece which opens with some beautiful guitar work -- the guitar solo in the body of the song, however, is inaudible; and of course, those first two songs on side one. These highlights, however, are matched by faults. "Keep Coming Back" is a speed-thrash sounding rag that totally breaks the sound of the album; "The Wheel" is a lame attempt at some sort of metaphysical consciousness; I'll stop here for the sake of brevity.

Once upon a time an album could contain a couple of hit songs and a bunch of nothing fillers and be considered a good album. It seems to me that this time is past. An album today must have value as a whole work of art. There is definite potential here, but there is also a pervading cynicism present. It's almost as if the band would rather be doing something else, and for the most part, it is this characteristic which keeps Shooting Rubber Bands at the Stars in the realm of the great Almost. ☹

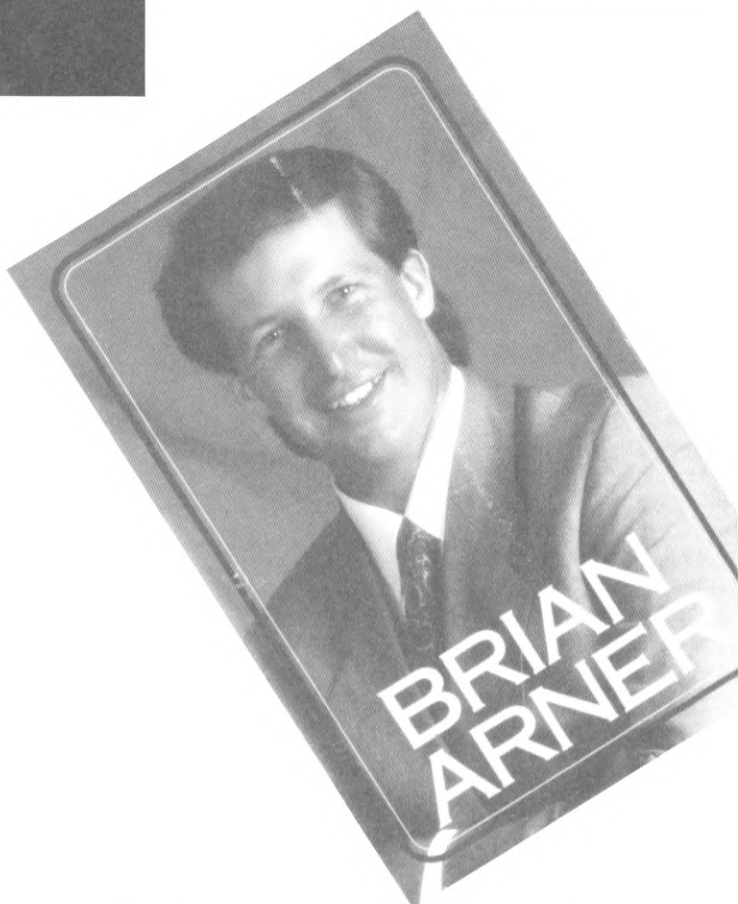

While I do enjoy listening to a great voice and I like to appreciate a vocalist's ability, I don't like the bellow - it - out - and - quit style of the 1-800 # gospel singers of the world. 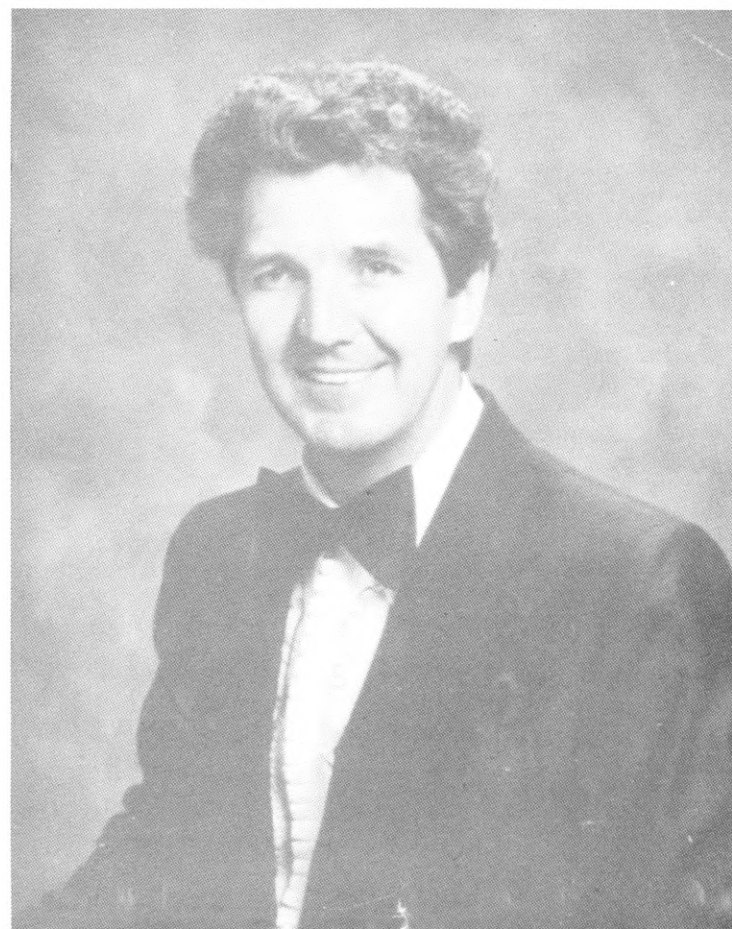

Edwards is a freshman majoring in computers. He will be playing the center position. His hometown is Jacksonville, Florida.

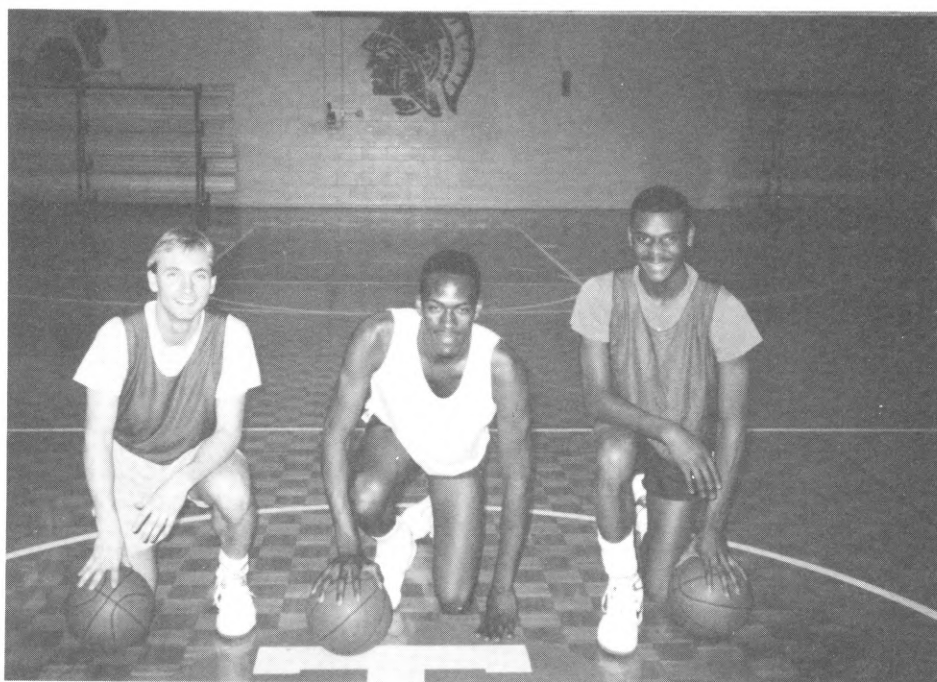
Commenting on his impression of Trevecca he said the programs of study were run a lot better here.

Wilson also said that Peachers was beneficial as a rebounder for the team and that Edward has great potential for the Trojan's future.



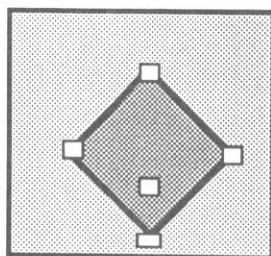

The first year, or junior year, is spent taking classes, and the second year, or senior year, is spent doing rotations in various fields, (for which they don't receive pay).

The students mentioned that in the Fall they will have access to the Vanderbilt library and anatomy labs which are furnished with cadavers.

"We take the same classes as a student studying to be a doctor. We just don't take our classes for as long," Mercer said.

According to Nurse Wilma Gallup, the Physician Assistant students observe clinic patients when being treated by Dr. Moredock, clinic doctor and head of the Allied Health Department.

"The patients can request that the PA not be in the room observing if it makes them feel uncomfortable," Nurse Gallup said.

"We don't treat the patients we just learn by what we see," Hill said.

According to the PA students they are learning how to give physical exams, patient history (asking patient of past illness or complications), and clinical

medicine.

Many of the PA students agreed that the work was fun and exciting despite the sacrifices they must make.

"Students completing the program and college requirements will be awarded a Bachelor of Science degree and a physician assistant certificate. Students who already hold a baccalaureate degree and complete the program requirements will be awarded a certificate and a second Bachelors of Science degree," as stated by the PA handout.

The job outlook for Physician Assistants are excellent.

Upon graduation "there are nine jobs for every physician assistant," Mercer said.

Finally, many ask the use and need of PAs. The PA pamphlet stated that "PAs working with physicians promote better distribution of health care services and can improve access to care in rural and underserved communities, as well as among the elderly."

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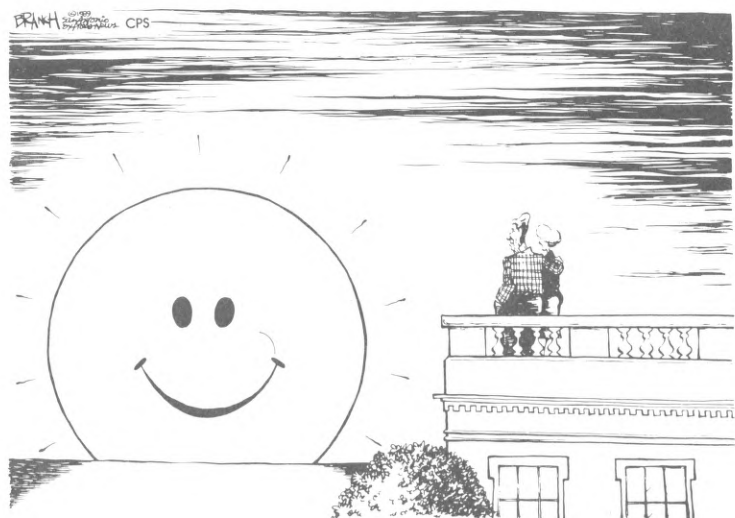

It seems that an old pestilence that we thought we had silenced has returned. I am speaking of none other than that lying prima donna of Libya, Col. Muammar Qaddafi. Some may have thought of President Reagan's past bombing attacks on his country as a bit harsh. I would tend to differ since what we have here is another Hitler just buying his time. The jets' carrier was 100 miles off the coast of Libya, the jets were 50 miles off the coast of Libya, and 600 miles from the site of the plant when the attack occurred. Qaddafi earlier accused the U. S. of wanting an attack as an attempt on his life, and if this is so, then why did he provoke the U. S. by attacking our Naval jets? The answer is simple. Qaddafi is a prima donna liar. Qaddafi claims the Libyan MIGs were merely reconnaissance vessels. U. S. camera's on the Naval jets reveal that these MIGs were armed. Also, the

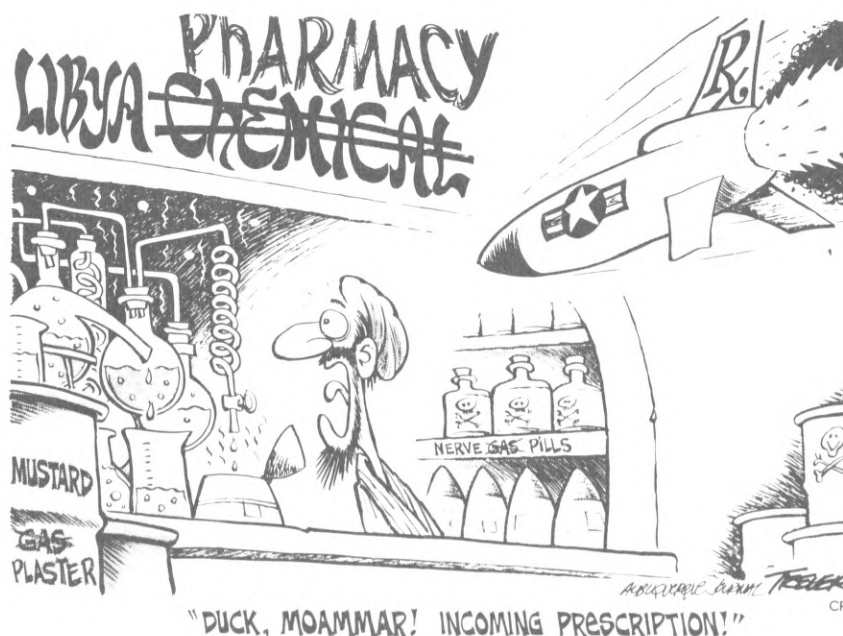

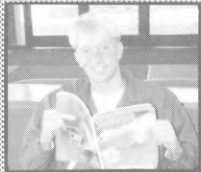

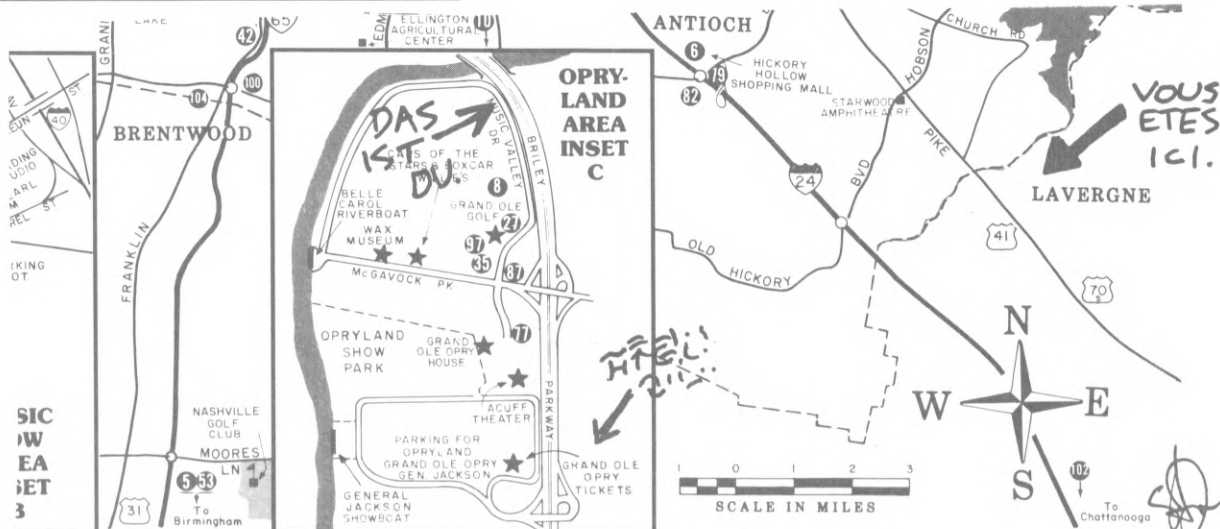
