The Men's Athletic Association under the capable leadership of Harold Hughes had a landmark year in which they had two "firsts." They sponsored the first ping-pong tournament at Trevecca in which there were matches for boys' singles, boys' doubles and girls' singles. They also sponsored the first track season in the history of the M. A. A. which climaxed with the annual all-school field day.

The M. A. A. also sponsors a football season, a basketball season and a softball season each year.

The sports life also takes in the Girls' Athletic Association led by Nina Griggs. The G. A. A. sponsors a basketball season, a softball season, participation in the field day activities, and hiking teams.

The four teams that participate in intramural sports are divided as follows: Upperclassmen, Sophomores, Freshman and High School.
