TNU's conference fans the flame of service to the family

On March 21st, Trevecca hosted its first Conference on the Family. This was the highlight event of the "Year of the Family," Trevecca's first of four theme years leading up to our centennial celebration in 2001.

The *Conference on the Family: Creating a New Balance* was the first conference in which TNU targeted the entire Nashville area Christian community, both Christian parents and family professionals. The response was very positive. The plenary session with Dr. David Elkind, national child expert, had approximately 350 in attendance. The Saturday conference featured both a

professional track, led by Christian author/therapist, H. Norman Wright, and an enrichment track offering 24 workshops in parenting, and educational and spiritual issues within families.

Twenty-four outstanding Christian professionals from the Nashville area lead the enrichment workshops.

The conference was a success in many ways, but none greater than the positive effect it had for

TNU in the local (non-Nazarene) Christian and professional community. About 80% of the attendees had never been on the Trevecca campus, and were unfamiliar with the university. The conference evaluations underscored the positive comments conference workers heard all day regarding the quality of the event and the friendliness of the campus personnel. Our student volunteers were praised for their kindness and efficiency.....100% of the evaluations rated the conference personnel "excellent" for their helpfulness and presentation. Many attendees requested their names be put on a mailing list for future TNU events and the evaluations listed

comments such as: "It would be hard to top the three excellent sessions we attended." "This conference was excellent; we feel fortunate to have been here." But the one comment that reflected the true reason for the day was from a young teen who attended with her YCAP counselor: "At (my) home there's 24 hours of arguing and fighting. There was one here to help me with my problem. Thank you."

Organizers believe the conference presented the insights and truths of a loving God to those who could incorporate them into their lifestyles, and into the countless lives they touch. It was a successful day, and God gets the glory.

TNU student to teach in China

Debbie Harris will not be returning to school next year, but not for any of the usual reasons. She will be too busy teaching English in China.

Debbie has been selected to work with the English Language Institute/China in a program called the China Teaching Fellowship. She will work with students ranging from kindergarten to twelfth grade. As of August 10th she will be required to fulfill a one-year contract.

"This is a great honor and responsibility for Debbie and for the Trevecca community," said Dr. Porter King, Trevecca's sponsor for

the Institute. "I am sure she will do a fine job."

Debbie, a non-traditional student, is a junior currently working on her major in English. She is also working in the Financial Aid Office.

"I can't believe how the Lord is opening the doors for me," said Debbie. "I was selling my

Debbie says she is a little apprehensive about going to a foreign country but she is not afraid. She will be working and living with 10 other people while she is in China. "The China Teaching fellowship (CTF) . . . is just that: a complete fellowship, with nearly all expenses paid," said Todd Culpepper, marketing director for ELIC.

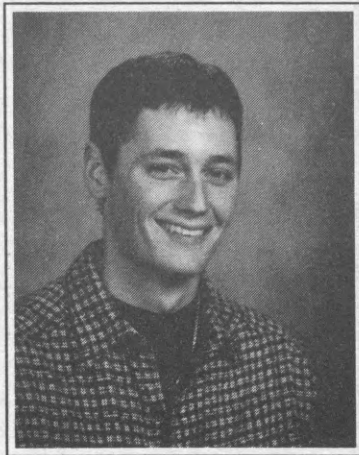

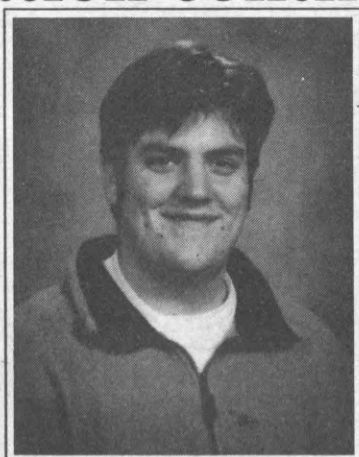

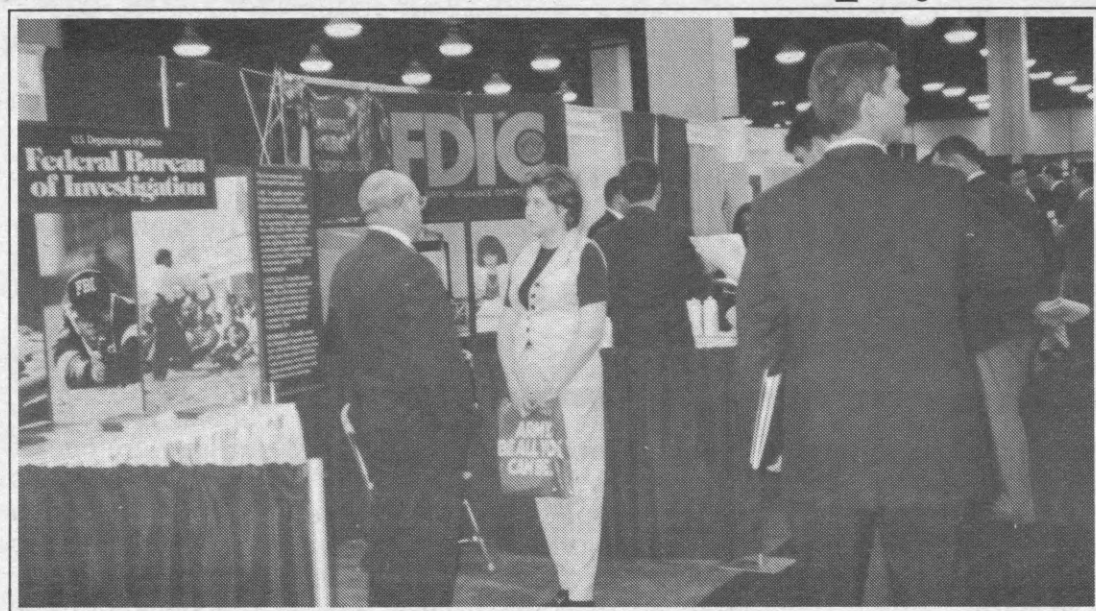
I have a lot of memories of SGA football games at SGA retreat and the endless jokes about my office. These are some of the memories that I hope will last throughout my life.
