

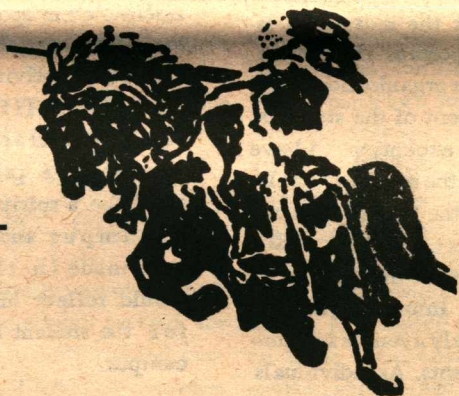

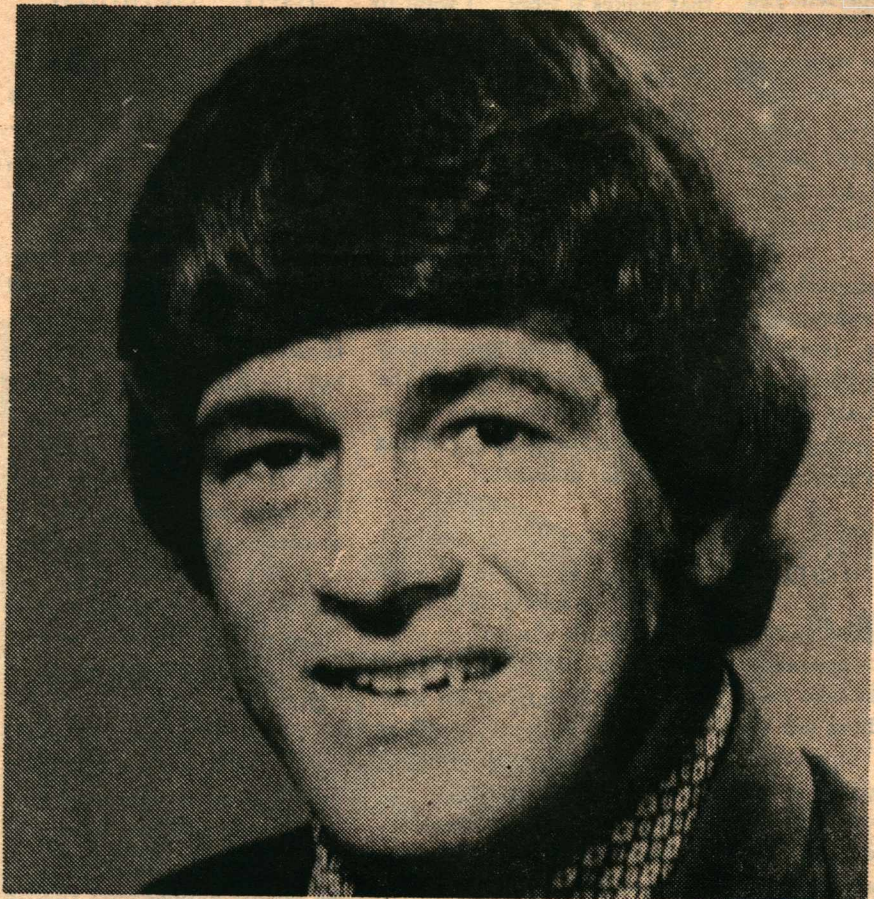

I do not mean that nothing should be funded unless it benefits everyone, but student funding should benefit, directly or indirectly, a significant number of persons.

Late minute fines are also too stiff. Perhaps a graduated system could be devised which would increase with time, but reduce the cost for someone who is only five or ten minutes late.

Library hours are another point. After all the work has been done to open the library on Friday night, we now find the library is open one half hour less than before.

I feel these and other issues need our attention, and would appreciate the chance to work on them.

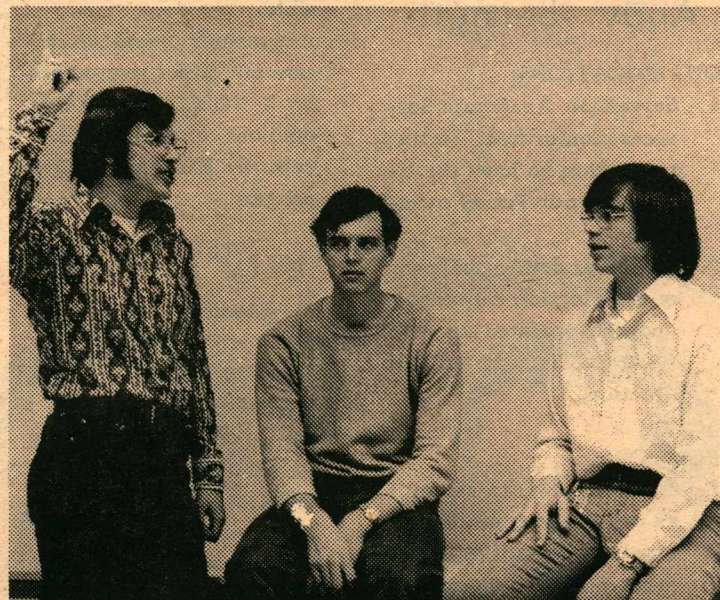
I want to be elected senator so that I can have a chance to do and say something about this in a meaningful way.

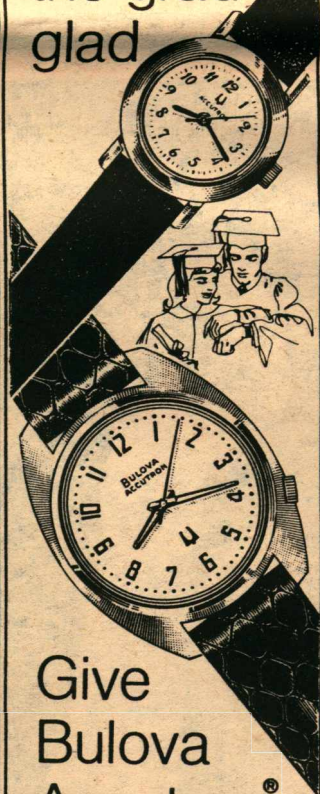
2. The budget is of particular interest, especially look into organizations such as Model U.N., Forensics and AWS.

QUALIFICATIONS:

1. Served on Academic Services Committee. Initiated action to have the library open on Friday evenings.
2. Served as acting chairman of the election committee and administrated the 1973 ASNNC Executive officers election.

PLATFORM:

1. If elected I will survey a sampling of the class at regular intervals to determine majority opinion on specific issues and vote accordingly.
2. Society meetings should not be required as chapel attendance. The senate is able to at least initiate action to eliminate such requirement.
3. The ASNNC budget should be reevaluated, giving partial funding to Model United Nations and Forensics, and limiting the executive officers' travel budget.
4. A legal aid service should

be instituted as soon as possible.

6. As a senator I would maintain my direct responsibility to the class and their opinions, and keep the concept of a Kingdom College primary.

It is important that you not only know who I am, but what I believe in. Thus as a candidate for Junior Class Senator, I believe we must begin moving in four New Directions.

PLATFORM:

1. The open dorm policy should be liberalized and relaxed to include several visiting hours every week on a given day (i.e. - every Sunday afternoon).
2. Four things should be done to improve the disciplinary system.
 - A. Another student member should be added to the Student Life Executive Committee.
 - B. The Dean of Men and Dean of Women should be removed from the SLEC and replaced by two other administra-

tors.

- C. We should cooperate with the Administration to try to complete the "procedures of investigation" that will delineate the rights of students who are being investigated by the SIEC (i.e. - the right to have only facts related to the charges against you be presented during the trial).

- D. Information should be given to all students explaining the disciplinary system and the rights that students have in relation to it.

3. Students need a greater role in the academic process in two ways.

- A. More student representation on the Academic Council, which is in charge of general academic policy (i.e. the new credit system).
- B. Student representation on the divisional and departmental councils.

4. I personally support the abolition of Women's Dorm Hour's and the establishment of a pass key system.

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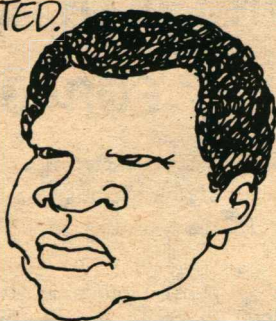

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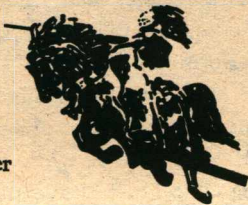

Hardness of the heart is easily disguised. It may be called prudence. It may be called devotion to duty. It may be called accomplishment.

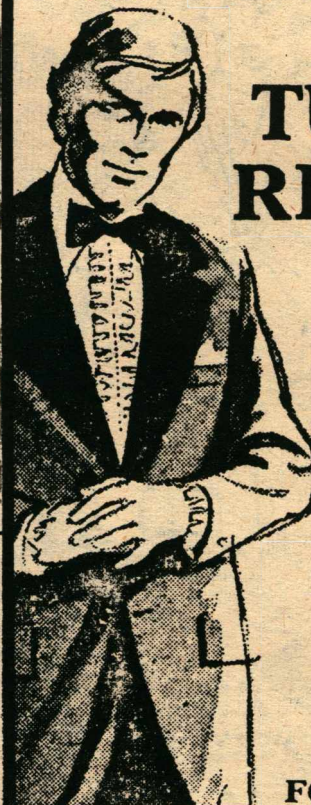
It is important to daily keep the channels of communication with God open. One cannot obey God if he does not take the time to listen and provide the opportunities for Him to speak.

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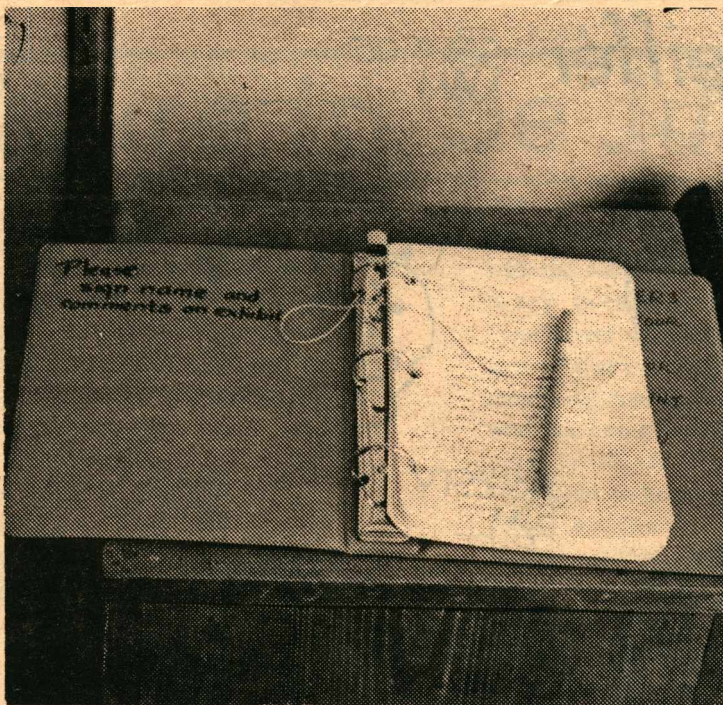
NNC choirs to appear on television

Paintings receive praise

The art lover will find ample satisfaction for his enthusiasm as he views the Marie Wilner paintings now on exhibit in the Foyer of the Fine Arts Building. Sponsored by the Old Bergen Art Guild of New Jersey, the exhibit has been on the NNC campus since April 5. All paintings are for sale.

Mrs. Wilner's style is a striking mixture of both abstract and impressionistic elements ranging from the cool, nostalgic serenity of "In the Park," to the blistering orange harshness of "Northern Sunset." Some of the

paintings such as "The Everglades," are extremely impressionistic, while others, such as "Western Salt Flats," are so abstract that one would be lost in identifying the subject without the title.

Mrs. Wilner does not seem to prefer any particular colors, as the dozen paintings on display are done in browns, reds, and brilliant greens, with bold strokes of gold and scarlet throughout, to create odd plays of sunlight, or curious shadows. Mrs. Wilner does have her own particular technique, however. She paints with oils on paper,

rather than on canvas which creates an interesting texture.

Near the display is a guest book in which visitors are invited to write personal comments. Upon reading the comments, this writer noted that a few of the viewers seemed to be especially taken with "Symphony in Green," and "Spring," two startling, green compositions. The most frequently used adjective in the visitors' comments were "impressed," or "impressing."

One or two of the comments were extraordinarily thoughtful, but the bravest must have been this: "Interesting . . . I'm glad our northern sunsets really aren't like that."

The paintings will be on display through tomorrow.

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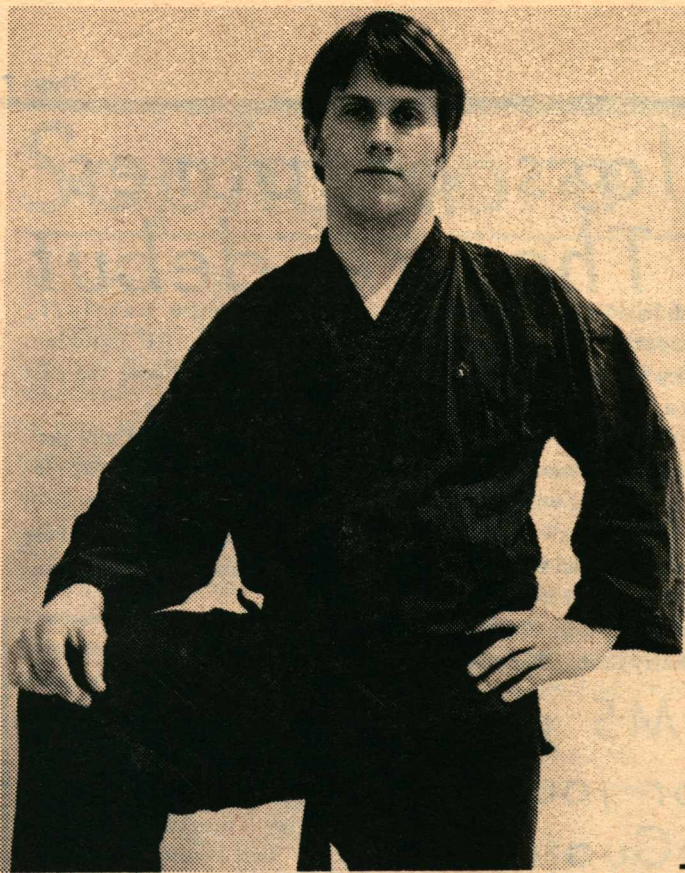

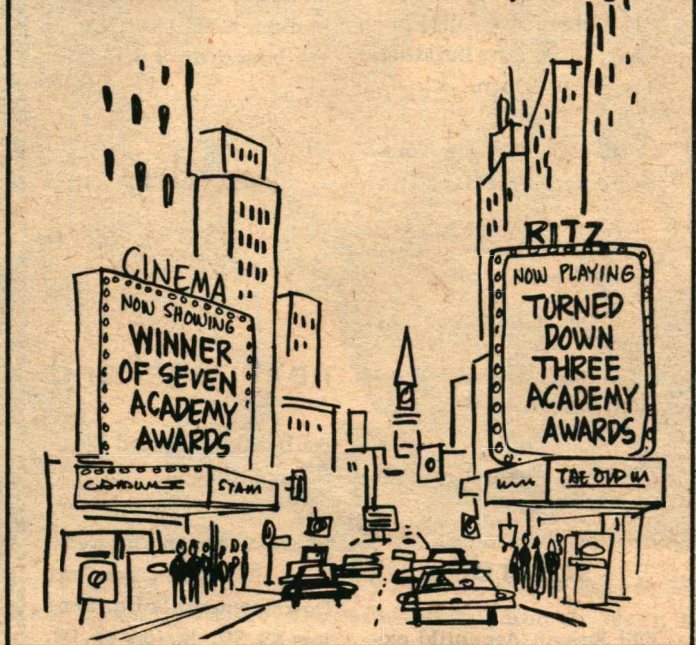
In kata competition Stewart, Charlene Harrison and Colleen Kelly swept the first

NNC track team takes second in Invitational

Last Saturday's NNC Invitational track meet became the Ontario Invitational after a deluge of rain left the Nampa High School track under several inches of water. Once on their home track the Treasure Valley Community College Chukars avenged their April 7 loss to the Crusaders. The final point tally was TVCC 64, NNC 57 1/2, Oregon Technical Institute 28, and College of Idaho 13 1/2.

NNC's chances for victory in the meet were hampered early when Bob Jackson pulled up lame with a hamstring muscle pull during the first event, the 440 yard relay. The Crusaders placed second in that relay, but without Jackson they managed only a third by Carl Cady in the 440 yard dash. The mile relay also suffered because of Jackson's absence, and had to settle for second.

On the brighter side, NNC produced the only double winners of the day. Dave Mangum won both the 100 and 220 yard dash, and Steve Wolfe did well in his specialty, taking the long and triple jumps. Wolfe also took second in the 220 and tied for second in the century. Other winners for NNC were Rob Edwards in the three mile run, Dick Huling in the 880 yard dash, and Jerry Harris in the 440 yard intermediate hurdles. Dean Cook improved in the shot put and placed second.

Tony Grant of Oregon Tech set the only new NNC Invitational meet record with a javelin throw of 229 feet 6 inches. Next Crusader track and field action is tonight under the lights at Nampa High School. Field events begin at 6:30 p.m. with running events to follow at 7:00 p.m.

Westerburg to defend meet title

Tim Westerburg represented NNC in the Boise State Invitational Golf Meet last Thursday and Friday. Westerburg managed to place in the top 15 finishers among the 55 competitors from the nine schools represented.

Weber State captured the team trophy, followed closely by the College of Idaho. The medalist from Weber State tore up the course with scores of 70 and 68, finishing seven strokes ahead of the rest of the of the pack.

Westerburg was the only participant from NNC in this top-level competition. He wasn't overly pleased with his showing, (77-76) saying he played generally good golf but just couldn't sink the putts.

Tomorrow NNC's golfers will be hitting the Purple Sage Golf Course in Caldwell for the Idaho-Oregon Invitational. Westerburg is the defending medalist for this meet.

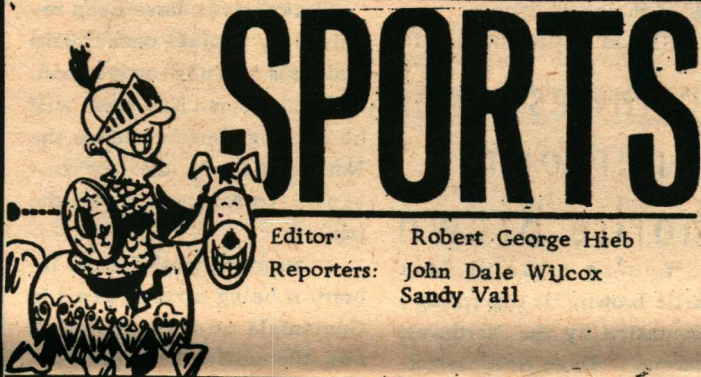
