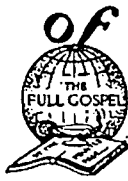

Removing the Land Marks

THE other day I undertook to read an article on "What is the Matter With the World Today?" "Is Society Immoral?" or some such a title as that; but at the outset the author said that before one can speak intelligently on a subject of this kind it is necessary to distinguish the incidentals from the fundamentals and define goodness and badness. And it was evident that he set out to make an easy case for himself; for he said "It has ever been that men have persecuted their contemporaries and canonized the ancients; they have convicted their sisters and daughters while they praised their grandmothers." So he said we just don't like whatever we have, and the principal charge against the present is that it is different from the past. The result of the line of reasoning was to finally reach the conclusion that nothing is bad within itself and that people are not bad, they are only *different*.

And since the disease was reasoned away, of course there was no need for a remedy; hence there is nothing to fear the "Modernism" which rejects the Virgin birth and Deity of Christ, the truth of spiritual regeneration and of the baptism with the Holy Spirit. If men deny the divine inspiration of the Scriptures it is just because they are *different* from their fathers; if they refuse to believe in the existence of a hell for the impenitent, and if they pass lightly of the possibility of a future judgment before God Almighty, well they are not to be classed as vicious infidels. In other words, we can make and keep all men right by the simple process of moving the land marks every time they move and lowering the standards any time that they are slow to measure up to them.

But there is a Law Giver who was and still is in authority, His precepts are true and His law is holy. His standards are correct and His requirements are enforced by means of adequate penalties. Things are not right or wrong because they are either old or new, they are right if they are in harmony with God and His Bible and wrong if they are out of harmony with these. People are not saved because they are either dead or living, they are saved because they repented and believed on Christ through whom alone is everlasting life. True, every generation is responsible for its own light, but upon this principle present sin is never to be condoned. Even though "hand join in hand" until sin of a certain type becomes all but universal, it still shall not go unpunished. The safety of innocence belongs only to the ignorant; for the world of guilty mankind a blood atonement is required. Sinners, conscious of their guilt, can escape the vengeance of eternal fire only by fleeing to Christ for refuge. The defilement of sin in the heart disqualifies any one for happiness in heaven, and, therefore, requires the impartation of Christ's holiness. "Ye must be born again" is an imperative as universal as the sense of sin. "Without holiness no man

shall see the Lord" is the unqualified declaration of Him in whose hand our destiny rests. Making the way to God easier than the Bible makes it is the most merciless thing that any one can do; for who is man that he should reply against his Maker? And who is there that can guarantee entrance into heaven save Him who said, nothing "that defileth or maketh a lie" can pass the portals of the Resting Place of the Saints? Thou shalt not remove thy neighbor's landmark, which they of old time have set in thine inheritance, which thou shalt inherit in the land that the Lord thy God giveth thee to possess it."

Neglecting the Bible Is Expensive

Recently a number of men, including Henry Ford, who have not usually been forward in expressing religious sentiments have spoken of the advantages of teaching the Bible to the youth of our times. Bro. L. D. Peavy of Mass. recently sent the editor a clipping which says, "The Bible is being taught in the United States Military Academy at West Point, New York. It has never been taught there until this year." Kentucky has recently passed a law providing for the reading of the Bible in the public schools of that state. And there are other indications of an awakening of interest in "The Book of Books." Among these last is the record of the largest sale of Bibles during the last year that has ever taken place in a similar period of time.

Apparently, statesmen, judges, manufacturers, educators, in fact, all men who think are awakening to the fact that neglecting the Bible has cost Western civilization and the world more than any other sin of commission or omission during the passing generation. When people neglect the Bible they become weak in their consciousness and conviction of God and His laws; it is then but natural for fallen men to become truce breakers (for when men cease to fear God, the oath loses its sanctity) and stable civil government cannot then long exist. Those who mutilate the Bible or deny its inspiration are doing the most effective service possible for the downfall of morality and the ruin of the nation.

When God, the Bible and divine things are "cheap" in the estimation of men, honor, truth, property and human life are also cheap and crime grows apace with no effective barrier.

The *Kansas City Star* says:

"The need of more contact with the Book, admittedly the greatest influence in Western civilization, is great. There have been many revelations of the scanty acquaintance with the Scriptures on the part of modern youth. One of these was furnished in Missouri last week, when the results of a survey made by the teacher training school of the Central Missouri Teachers' College, at Warrensburg, were announced. The survey was made among one hundred students at the college and high school students in a half

dozen cities of the state, and these were some of the results:

Sixteen per cent of the students neither knew where Christ was born nor the name of his mother. Sixty per cent knew not that Peter, James and John enjoyed the larger confidence of Jesus. Seventy per cent did not know what to call the Sermon on The Mount. Sixty per cent did not know what Christ said about loving one's neighbor. Twelve per cent did not know the first clause in The Lord's Prayer. Sixty-five per cent did not know the Golden Rule."

It has been shown that two-thirds of the boys and girls of today are not receiving any kind of religious instruction."

We must have a revival of religion, and that revival must begin with, be coetaneous with and be continued by a revival of Bible study and Bible faith and practice. In fact, it must be a "Bible revival." In the home, in the church and in the school, in every place and by every legitimate means let us encourage Bible reading and study and be, ourselves, good examples of this important practice.

IT CAN BE DONE

AFTER reading the report of the General Treasurer and our editorial in the HERALD of HOLINESS for April 16, a beloved brother said, "Our people have not understood how pressing the needs for our general interests are, and now that they know, they will do their best and that will mean that they will pay up the budget." The remark seemed a little optimistic at the time, but within the few weeks that have followed since it has been justified by the decided increase in the gifts of our people. I think if a new report were given now it would show that we gave as much during the month of April as we did in the previous two months and a half. Even at this, the giving has not been great, only the *increase* has been so noticeable, and it is that alone that suggested the adoption of C. B. Jernigan's slogan as the title for this editorial. It is not done—I do not say that, but "It can be done."

The General Assembly interpreted the wish of the people as being favorable to a more systematic and regular method of raising the money necessary to the promotion of our general work and appointed the "General Board" to inaugurate plans of a practical nature and agreeable to the desires of our pastors and people. The General Board and its officers have been busy formulating these plans and publishing them to us through the *Other Sheep*, the HERALD of HOLINESS and the special literature which they have sent

out. But some seem to have thought that this *education* would be quite sufficient, and so have neglected to give as hitherto until that portion of the year's apportionments which should have been in the hands of the General Treasurer by this time is greatly in arrears. What should our General Board do? Should it sit still and say nothing until the last of the year and then come to us with a desperate appeal just before time for the books to close? Should we pay thousands of dollars in interest for borrowed money to pay the salaries of our missionaries? Should we pass the year with no progress in general home missions, church extension and the other general work of our denomination, just waiting for the money to come in?

There would be very few among us who would counsel doing as we have suggested above and it is the decision of the General Board not to do it that way. Educational Day is past and now for the next few weeks and months we must turn our attention to Foreign Missions and to the general work of our church.

Of course we appreciate the efforts of the General Board to help us as Districts, local churches and individuals to a better system of giving, but the fact is whether we are all convinced that we should tithe or not, whether we are convinced that the plan of having a general budget is best or not, whether we prefer one plan or the other, one thing should be clear to the dullest of us, viz., *we must have the money* to take care of the work which God has committed to us as a people. If you are a systematic giver, the call now is "Bring all the tithes into the store house." If you are a spasmodic giver, the time has come for you to "get stirred up" and give. It will be necessary for our people to give \$75,000.00 by July 1 in order that the General Treasurer may have in the amount due on the apportionments for the first half of 1924. That looks pretty big, but "It can be done." How? Let every church that is following the budget plan for its finances bring its budget in full up to date. Let every church that has not adopted the full budget plan, but which knows how much it should have raised for missions and other general interests, set in at once to bring its pro rata up in full. Then for good measure and to atone for some churches in the less favored sections of the country and for those which have just been organized and are having a struggle getting their feet down, let every church have a special Missionary service, or else present some other of the general interests and take a good full, well rounded offering. Then there should be a good many who have special thank offerings which they are glad to give at this time. Pay in through the regular channels of the church, send it direct to the General Treasurer, or follow some other regular or irregular method, but *give the money*. Notes and promises may do good in stirring you up to carry out your intentions, but the General Board needs *money* now. We must stir ourselves up to gifts

small and large, "As the Lord has prospered." There must be no quibbling over methods and plans, there must be *execution*. Many of you will receive letters from Bro. Anderson, some of you will hear the General Superintendent at the District Assembly, some of you will hear the appeal from your District Superintendent and pastor, some of you will hear no appeal except from the Spirit of God and your own conscience; but by any means, this program of our church can be carried out and ought to be carried out and will be carried out, *if we carry it out*.

LIMITING THE PREACHER'S SCOPE

THIS afternoon a man was telling me that he questioned whether a preacher should call upon people to "prepare for the future," because the ideal of simply escaping punishment is so groveling that it is doubtful whether one can be really saved or not who is moved by no higher motive. As he talked on, I remembered that there are some who say that the preacher should not preach much on the details and horrors of sin, some that say it is easy to give the wrong impression by preaching on the joys of salvation, because the trials are also very real, some who say he should not preach much on the details of practical holiness, because "if you shoot the bird in the heart the feathers will fall." Some would account it a crime for the preacher to mention politics, etc. And, I decided that if the preacher were to follow the advice of all he would have nothing left that would be worth while, and I fear that this is the course that some have attempted to pursue.

The fact is the preacher has an almost unlimited scope. If he uses common sense and does not become a dictator or a bigot, he should have a right to speak on any subject that concerns the present or future welfare of the people to whom he ministers. It is the preacher's task to give "soul" to the world. There are no distinct lines between the various interests of life. That is to say, life itself is bigger than any and all of its divisions. Business, politics, society, and religion are but spheres in which the immortal man lives and moves and these spheres are overlapping and intertwined. A man cannot be right in his religion and wrong in his business, crooked in his politics or unmindful of his duties to family and society in general. If the preacher confines himself to religion, he will be but a mockery to the needs of men. The Prophet of the Lord should not allow himself to be restricted in the scope of his interest or limited in his field of truth.

We would not say that our God never reaches a hand of mercy to those whose hearts are not right with Him—this lost, rebellious world would otherwise upon the instant cease to exist to offend; and we remember the ten lepers healed while but one gave God the glory. But this we do know that devout recognition and loving obedience toward God opens for us confidence in the Almighty that is restful assurance of His care.

Why We Teach the Eradication of Carnality

NUMBER ONE

Rom. 8:7: "The mind of the flesh [the carnal mind] is enmity against God: for it is not subject to the law of God, neither indeed can it be: and they that are in the flesh cannot please God." (R. V.)

The word for "flesh" is *sarx*, used in the New Testament 140 times. It sometimes means the *human body*: sometimes it means *human nature*, and again, *humanity*. Sometimes it means carnality, or *depravity*, as in the above passage; also in Gal. 5:19-21, "Now the works of the flesh are manifest, which are these: adultery, fornication, uncleanness, lasciviousness, idolatry, witchcraft, hatred, variance, emulations, wrath, strife, sedition, heresies, envyings, murders, drunkenness, revellings, and such like." Now the first four sins in this list are physical sins. But it will be noticed that the next eleven sins in the list are purely mental and spiritual sins having no connection with the body. So the word "flesh" here must refer to that moral derangement of our being which prompts us to sin. We call it in common speech CARNALITY OR DEPRAVITY. It means a violation of our moral nature, a perverse tendency to sin.

Jesus referred to this same vile something within us, which prompts us to evil, when He said: "For from within, out of the heart of men, evil thoughts proceed, fornications, thefts, murders, adulteries, covetings, wickednesses, deceit, lasciviousness, an evil eye, railings, pride, foolishness. All these evil things proceed from within." (R. V.)

Here again is a list of thirteen forms of sin, and only three or four of them are physical.

We gather from the above facts that there is an inward *corruption of being* not natural to our race, as it was originally created by God. But we need no Bible to prove human depravity. The man that denies it is playing the fool with his own intellect. Every issue of a daily newspaper, every lock on door or window, every constable, sheriff or policeman, every lockup, jail or prison, every criminal law on our statute-books, and every criminal court, and every living sinner is standing evidence that ours is a fallen race.

The most common name for sin in the New Testament—*hamartia* is thus defined in the lexicon: 1. Error, offense, sin [meaning our voluntary sins]; 2. A principle or cause of sin: proneness to sin, sinful propensity." It is often called "*in-bred sin*,"—the tendency to sin which we inherited by race connection from Adam.

Now the question arises, Is there deliverance from this inbred sin, or depravity? This question profoundly concerns every member of the human family.

We believe this depravity can be got rid of, and that its removal from our nature was provided for in the atonement of Jesus Christ. We think so:

I. Because it would be unreasonable to suppose that God would have allowed a moral race to be "propagated" under conditions in

which it could not possibly be pleasing to Him. As God made our first parents they were pleasing to Him. They were made in His own image, and He pronounced them "very-good." It was superlative praise for infinite wisdom to bestow.

But sin marred the image. There is now a foreign element indwelling in our nature which is "enmity against God;" "for it is not subject to the law of God, neither, indeed, can be, and they that are in the flesh [in this corrupt condition] cannot please God." Now who shall say that the atonement of Jesus Christ does not provide for the removal from our nature of anything and everything which is displeasing to God? To me the proposition is unthinkable. God says: "To this end was the Son of God manifested that He might destroy the works of the Devil." And certainly no achievement of the Devil was so disastrous to the human family as the injection into every human life of a spirit of alienation from God, a trend to evil, a tendency to sin. This is the black monster which produces all the Satanic brood of sins that were ever committed. This corruption of our nature was Satan's masterpiece. And to say that he could put an evil into us that the cleansing blood of Christ and the fire of the Holy Spirit cannot remove, is to rob God of His supreme glory, and to put the crown of Omnipotence upon Satan's head. True piety shrinks from so abhorrent a conclusion. Reverence for an Almighty God refuses to accept as conclusive any arrogance which can logically end in consequences so fatal to the glory of our Infinite Redeemer.

II. WE THINK THIS TAIN OF NATURE CAN BE REMOVED BECAUSE OF THE MEANING OF THE VERBS WHICH GOD USES WITH REGARD TO IT.

1. In Ephesians 4:22 He says "PUT OFF" (apotithimi) the "Old Man."

2. In 1 John 3:8, He says, "The Son of God was manifested that He might DESTROY (luo) the works of the Devil."

3. In Rom. 6:6 we are assured that provision was made in the Atonement for the Old Man to be "CRUCIFIED." (sustoroo.)

4. In the same verse we are told that the "body of the sin," ("Our tendency of alienation from God."—Tholuck) might be DESTROYED (katargeo).. The definition of the word is "to put an end to," "to annihilate."

5. In Rom. 6:18 and 22, we are told that we can be "set free from" THE SIN (principle). (eleutheroo.)

6. In Col. 2:9-11 we are told we can have a spiritual circumcision which consists in the "PUTTING OFF" (apekdusii) the body of the flesh," meaning the same as the "body of the sin" in Rom. 6:6.

7. In 2 Tim. 2:21 we are told that "if a man purge himself from these [sins] he shall be sanctified." Notice a purged man is a sanctified man. The verb for "purged," (ekkathairo) means "to cleanse thoroughly," "to purge out," "to eliminate."

8. In Col. 3:5 we are told to mortify the sin. The verb is *nekroo*, which means "TO KILL," "to put to death." Bishop Ellicott says the aorist tense in the text means: "TO KILL AT ONCE."

In the Old Testament we learn the same.

9. In Isaiah 1:25 we learn that the dross of inward sin is to be "TAKEN AWAY," and "PURGED AWAY."

10. In Ezek. 36:25, God promises to CLEANSE from all filthiness.

11. In Mal. 3:3, we are told that God will PURIFY the sons of Levi and PURGE them as gold and silver. The figure is that of purifying precious metals, by separating the alloy from the gold.

Now here are twelve verbs in the Old and New Testaments which teach God's method of dealing with this internal indwelling sin.

They all unite in declaring that He will "crucify" it, "kill" it, "destroy" it, "eliminate" it, "burn" it out, "take it away," "purge it out," "cleanse it" from the soul.

And what is more, no other kinds of verbs are used when describing God's method of dealing with this old foe of inbred sin dwelling in our beings.

The logical conclusion is irresistible. God PROPOSES, IF WE WILL CONSENT TO IT, TO CLEANSE OUR HEARTS ENTIRELY AND FREE US FOREVER FROM THIS DEVILISH THING WITHIN US THAT CONSTANTLY TEMPTS US TO SIN.

And yet, with this overwhelming evidence in favor of the eradication of the Carnal mind, and nothing against it, there are men going about the country fiercely denying the destruction of the Carnal mind or the removal of depravity. There are institutions that dedicate themselves to the work of opposing the doctrine of real sanctification, or the cleansing of our nature from depravity. They industriously teach "SUPPRESSION" instead which still leaves in our moral nature, a fountain of corruption, "a root of bitterness," a "bent-to-backsliding," a *proneness* to depart from God.

All our preachers and teachers need to carefully study this subject, and thoroughly know the Scriptural grounds of our faith.

Studies in Revelation

"And there came one of the seven angels which had the seven vials and talked with me, saying unto me, Come hither; I will shew unto thee the judgment of the great whore that sitteth upon many waters: with whom the kings of the earth have committed fornication."

"So he carried me away in the spirit into the wilderness: and I saw a woman sit upon a scarlet colored beast, full of names of blasphemy, having seven heads and ten horns."

THIS woman is declared to be "the mother of harlots." The sun clad woman of the twelfth chapter, without doubt, represents God's Israel of whom will issue the Man Child, the Bride of Christ; and here is Satan's counterpart, mystical Babylon, the mother of harlots, the apostasy, out of whom will issue the Antichrist's idol, commercial Babylon. This woman which has long been recognized as a representation of apostate religion, is most frequently called the Roman Catholic Church, but Dr. Seiss properly points out that she must represent more than Catholicism, being the mother of harlots, for spiritual harlotry began centuries before the Catholic Church or its system existed. We therefore conclude that as the Sun clad woman was a representation of God's Israel from covering the whole period since at least the time of Abraham, so the Scarlet woman must symbolize spiritual harlotry, since at least the days of Nimrod, hence we affirm that an apostate religionist, whether in the days of Noah, or in the nineteenth century, belongs to the great horde which make up the Scarlet Woman, the mother of harlots.

At the present time, or in the succeeding years when Antichrist appears, the Jewish people and the Catholics, being the oldest religious denominations known, will probably contain a larger proportion of apostates than their sister denominations, but reader, if you are an apostate Protestant of any denomination, unless you repent and get back into God's favor, you will be found in the ranks of the Scarlet Woman and you will share her fate.

John was carried away in the spirit into the wilderness where he saw this woman. The reader will remember that the Sun Clad woman fled to the wilderness but we must look at the point of view in order to understand the difference in location of these two women. The Sun Clad woman was God's woman, she carried her spirit with her but she fled to a natural wilderness, or to a wilderness of nature; but the Scarlet Woman, arrayed in purple and scarlet, decked with gold and precious stones and pearls, having a golden cup in her hand, is in no natural wilderness, on the contrary, she is favored with earth's richest luxuries, but she is in a spiritual wilderness, a wilderness where God's smile is not seen or felt, a place where God's people do not reside.

The name written on her forehead is "Mys-

tery, Babylon." This mystery will be solved in due time. She is drunk with the blood of saints and with the blood of martyrs. Drunkenness is a form of insanity, a condition in which the mind becomes so deranged as to think that things are absolutely right and virtuous, which in one's right mind would appear absolutely wrong and abhorrent. Apostate religionists have always detested the genuine people of God, they have persecuted them even unto death, and without doubt much of the blood of martyrs has been shed by, or at the instigation of people who actually thought that they were doing the will of God. Read Acts 26:8-12.

Reader, do not think that the days of martyrdom are passed forever, the Scarlet woman will get another stranglehold under the dominion of the Antichrist. Church and State will again unite and there will be a united drive by apostate Jewry, apostate Catholicism and apostate Protestantism against genuine Christianity which will exceed anything of its kind that the old world has ever witnessed.

John wondered with a great wonder, (R. V.) he could not understand the vision, "And the angel said unto me . . . I will shew thee the mystery of the woman, and of the beast that carrieth her which hath seven heads and ten horns." To discern and be able to distinguish between a person and a system in the use of these symbols is not easy though necessary. The Great Red Dragon spoken of in the twelfth chapter of Revelation is the Devil himself for the Word plainly says so, but is this beast, being of the same description the same in its identity? We think not and the angel's description will, we think, prove it. It is of the same general character, it is inspired and operated by the Great Red Dragon, in other words it is his system, one that has been in operation for centuries.

"The beast that thou sawest, was and is not, [in other words, it was in operation but is not in operation now] and shall ascend out

of the bottomless pit and go into perdition." This looks like a personal identity but when we read the angelic analysis of its makeup we see it is not. "The seven heads are seven mountains on which the woman sitteth, and these are seven kings: R. V. [for seven kingdoms] five are fallen, and one IS, and the other is yet to come." This was the status of this system which had kept repeating itself up to the time that John wrote the vision. There were five kingdoms, (five past,) one present, the other future. At the time John wrote this, there had been five world kingdoms; we mean five different kingdoms which had held sway over practically the known world, they are Assyria under Nimrod, Egypt under the Pharaohs, Babylon under Nebuchadnezzar, Medo-Persia under Cyrus, then Darius, Greece under Alexander the Great, all of which had fallen when John wrote, and the Roman Empire was then in full sway, the one that is, or was, in John's time. This world nation system has been in operation now six times; six times some great conqueror has risen who has whipped the world into line; several have tried it and have not succeeded, notably Napoleon Bonaparte and the German Kaiser, but the seventh will come, seven is the perfect number and the seventh when the time is ripe will come, but he will be hindered until God's time. "For the mystery of iniquity doth already work until he who now hindereth will hinder until he be taken out of the way, and then shall that wicked one be revealed" (R. V. 2 Thess. 2:7, 8). The seventh world kingdom cannot be set up until the Holy Ghost has done His work and is taken out of the way and then will that wicked one be revealed.

John sees a world power system which keeps repeating itself, it has headed up six times and it will head up once more—seven times, seven heads—and it will fight, and devastate true religion in the world, it will run its course and then be destroyed by the Stone kingdom, the stone cut out of the mountain without hands that Daniel saw in the vision of Nebuchadnezzar's dream. Apostate religion thrives best under a godless world power which uses it for prestige and power and for gain. Without a shadow of doubt, the world will see again a union of the Church and State, one that will be more powerful, colder blooded and more cruel, than any that has ever risen and things are already shaping up for such a combination. The January number of the *Watchman* magazine gives the following list of countries that are exchanging diplomatic representatives with the Vatican at Rome: Argentina, Austria, Bavaria, Belgium, Bolivia, Brazil, Chile, Columbia, Costa Rica, Czecho-Slovakia, Ecuador, France, Germany, Great Britain, Haiti, Holland, Honduras, Hungary, Japan, Jugo-Slavia, Monaco, Nicaragua, Paraguay, Peru, Poland, Portugal, Prussia, Roumania, Russia, San Domingo, San Salvador, Spain, Switzerland, Uruguay, Venezuela—thirty-six in all. Some of these have ranks as ambassadors, others that of ministers. There is semi-official intercourse with still other countries. The New World, (Catholic) says "The diplomatic influence of the Holy See is the greatest in the history of the church." It is said that the Church of England is on the most friendly terms with the Vatican and some predict an early alliance

My Beloved People:

Number Five

I FIND it just a little lonely out here on this wide deep sea, but spend much of my time in prayer and meditation, as it is a little dark in my room for continued reading. I more clearly see why our Lord sent forth His disciples two by two, and I have come to the conclusion that it would be better judgment if the Nazarene people would follow His example. My dear Lord is very near and I am trusting in Him fully, hidden away in my little cabin for secret communion. There is very little to see except rolling waves and dashing spray. A few clouds hang low and once in a great while we see a distant ship; this is a very attractive sight, even if only the smoke from the stack is visible. One night we had a very beautiful sunset. The great round sun dipped in the west amidst fiery clouds, sending forth its tinselled glory in a thousand hues of golden glow, making the West look like a distant land of gorgeous beauty. Truly our God is a wonderful artist.

I never quite comprehended how much water there is on this old globe until I have tried to sail over this trackless deep. But if we had small oceans, the land would dry up. This great amount of water is necessary for evaporation which causes the rain and produces the crops. And thank God for the Infinite Spirit who is an ocean divine that we may have "floods upon the dry ground."

My mind returns to this great movement of which I am a small part. We have great opportunities. The whitened harvest fields call for ready reapers. The need of men and money for carrying on this great work is pressing and there are many problems to be met and solved. The one great object of our undertaking is to co-operate with God in the building of holy character. Our Lord was never much taken with varied systems of theology. He never put much stress upon customs, notions or forms of religiosity. He was more interested in the mighty flow of divine life. He declared that His mission was to give life, life more abundant. His Gospel is quite free from "Thou shalt not" and well filled with "Thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thine heart"—thus He gave us something that we can do without limit. He avoided reference to the past life of the poor woman at the well and told her of the water that would satisfy her every longing. How differently many holiness

preachers would have dealt with this case! They would have given a good exposure of her sin and would have gone about telling of her confession and would have shown what experts they are in uncovering sin. Peter failed, but our Lord did not say, "Now Peter you are backslidden and you know it, confess out now." No, He put the other side of the question, "Lovest thou me," and held Peter to that until the true confession was brought out. I have wondered if there is not a weakness in our preaching so many prohibitions that in the end may result in mere reforms. Our tendency is to judge the spiritual life of people by the way they dress, just as the Pharisees did. Would it not be better to preach the fulness of the blessing, the abundant life, the all sufficient grace, the supreme love of God, the glory of the abiding Holy Ghost? Years ago when I fell in love with the maiden who became my wife, I ceased to look for other companionships. And "since my eyes were fixed on Jesus, I've lost sight of all others besides, so enchained my spirit's vision looking at the crucified"

I talked with a man not long since regarding our position on worldly associations and membership in secret societies. He could not see any harm at all in such organizations. But I told him that our church law was not made just to be odd, but that the church is a light bearer, a conductor of spiritual power, a revival force, creating interest in eternal values. And just as there are some metals, lead for example, which are too soft and heavy to be good conductors of electricity, so a worldly mind is a poor conductor of spiritual blessings. There must be a refining process. God has promised to purge away our dross and bring us forth as silver and gold. We might grow faster if it were not for our standards on dress and worldly associations, but we are not anxious to produce even mountains of lead, we must get some pure metal that will conduct spiritual power. Revivals were never produced by men who live with and like the world. We have nothing against these worldly organizations as such, but they are intended for the people of the world. The Bible says, "Be not unequally yoked together with unbelievers" and we are anxious that our people be separate in order that they may be channels through which to bring

the blessings of God to all the people.

The world has always outnumbered the Church, but the Church must not be dominated by the world. The world mingles with the Church, and this we desire, but in such cases we are in the lead and can help the world back to God. It is indeed poor policy to unite with the world in order to help the world. We may follow the example of our Lord who ate with publicans and sinners only that He might teach them the "higher things." We might go to a dance, if like Peter Cartwright, we could be master of the situation and turn the dance into a prayermeeting. But when the Church yokes up with the world it is outnumbered to start with and is influenced by the world, rather than having power to lead the world back to God.

We must preach Christ as the great loving Nazarene and let Him draw us apart from this old world to higher things. Those quiet hours of our Quaker friends should never be discarded. Hundreds of people go to what they call "seances" and wait for the appearance of the spirits of the dead and seek to get the "atmosphere" ready for hearing from the dead, and shall we not the rather give much attention to preparations for the manifestations of the Spirit of God? Simple reforms in dress and association will not pay, we must have soul passion and true heart devotion and the glory of the divine Presence.

Thank God for our standards, and they must never be lowered. They must not even be lowered by our trusting in them. They are to protect us from the world, but they are empty things unless God's glorious presence is there to fill every part.

We need a thousand mighty heralds of the cross, living flames of holy passion to present Jesus Christ as the all sufficient Savior from sin. We will grow in grace as we live more in His holy presence and enjoy the consciousness of the Divine.

It is a problem to build a church which is free from the spirit of this age, but it can be done. There must be days of fasting and holding on by faith, there must be a loving, tender ministry filled with passion for the lost, then with the blessings of God upon us, we shall not fail.

Out here in this wide ocean of water, I am seeing oceans of grace and fathomless depths of infinite love, while billows of holy passion roll over my soul. Amen. And this amen is given in the spirit of Sister Walcott's definition: "So let it be and I will bear my part of the expenses."

if not an amalgamation of the two great denominations.

It is quite generally taught that the reign of the Antichrist will continue for seven years. Daniel says, "He shall confirm the covenant with many [of Daniel's people—the Jews] for one week, [seven year days] and in the midst of the week he shall cause the sacrifice and oblation to cease" (Dan. 9:27). The Jews will very largely follow him (the Antichrist) but they will not readily give up their

temple worship, and the Antichrist—full of satanic cunning—will not force things any faster than he can manage to get control; so he makes a covenant with them allowing them the freedom of their temple worship but in the midst of the three and a half years, he then breaks the covenant causing the sacrifice and the oblation to cease.

BE FILLED WITH THE SPIRIT

"And be not drunk with wine, wherein is excess; but be filled with the Spirit" (Eph. 5:18).

THIS IS A COMMAND TO CHRISTIANS. That these people to whom the Apostle wrote were already saved we can cite the following conclusive and unanswerable proof and argument:

They were "saints at Ephesus." Some little reading up on the condition of the city of Ephesus will show that if one were a saint at Ephesus he was no ordinary professor. In a city wholly given to idolatry, and filled with all wickedness they were perhaps known to all as saints.

They were "faithful in Christ Jesus." Not in and out, or up and down, but steadfast in the faith and work of Christ. There may have been some vacillating ones among them but this letter was written to the faithful.

They were sealed with the "Holy Spirit of promise," (Ch. 1:13). The seal of the heavenly notary—the Holy Spirit, had been placed on their souls to signify that in their profession of Christianity "it's done, the great transaction's done."

They had been regenerated. Of them it is said that "you hath he quickened, who were dead in trespasses and sins." Not a future but a past experience (Ch. 2:1).

They were already "saved by grace through faith" (Ch. 2:8).

THIS FILLING WITH THE SPIRIT WAS TO BE A SECOND EXPERIENCE in their Christian life. One must be born of the Spirit before he can be baptized (filled) with the Spirit.

The sealing with the Spirit which they already had was not the fulness but only the "earnest." They were commanded to be filled. By what they had received could they judge of whether it were profitable to receive a fulness of it. It certainly is. And one who has the witness of the Spirit to his conversion will want the filling with the Spirit in sanctification.

The burden of the Apostle's letter and daily

prayers was that they might have a second installment of divine grace. That they who were already quickened, saved, sealed, faithful, saints, might be filled with all the fulness of God. "For this cause I bow my knees unto the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ . . . that he would grant you, according to the riches of his glory, to be strengthened with might by his Spirit in the inner man; that Christ may dwell in your hearts by faith; that ye, being rooted and grounded in love, may be able to comprehend with all saints what is the breadth, and length, and depth, and height: and to know the love of Christ which passeth knowledge; that ye might be filled with all the fulness of God" (Eph. 3:14).

If they were already saved then the great endowment which he desired for them and which God inspired him to command them to obtain is a subsequent experience—a second blessing.

THE SPIRIT-FILLED CHRISTIAN'S MANIFESTATION. It goes without question that one who is filled with the Holy Spirit will manifest the Spirit of holiness—both inward and outward holiness. This manifestation will be both negative and positive. One will be free from the manifestations of the carnal nature, and will have the power of the Holy Ghost manifested in his heart and life.

There will be a fulness of joy. Jesus said, "He that believeth on me as the Scripture hath said, Out of his inmost soul shall flow rivers of living water, (but this spake he of the Spirit, which they that believe on him should receive: for the Holy Ghost was not yet given").

There will be a holy hilarity, "Speaking to yourselves in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody in your heart to the Lord" (Eph. 5:19).

There will be continuous praise, "Giving thanks always for all things unto God and the Father, in the name of the Lord" (vs. 20).

There will be beautiful submission in church unity (vs. 21). "Submitting yourselves one to another in the fear of the Lord."

THIS FILLING TO BE INSTANTLY ACCOMPLISHED. The fact that the command is in the language of the instant infers this. "Be (now) filled."

The fact that the Holy Spirit is a gift implies that it takes no longer than to receive a gift. God wants to hand His gift to us now.

The fact that the Holy Spirit is a person infers that it takes no longer to move in when He is invited and when the heart is prepared for His incoming, than it takes for one standing at the door to cross the threshold. The preparation for His reception may be a task of time but His entry is instantaneous.

All Bible instances of persons receiving the Holy Ghost prove that His incoming is instantaneous. On the day of the Pentecost he came "suddenly." At Cornelius' house He "fell" instantly upon them.

THIS COMMAND IS TO BE OBEYED NOW. If you, my friends, are like the Ephesians—saints, faithful Christians, have been quickened, and saved by grace; if you have been witnessed to by the Holy Ghost, then there is this great experience for you. If you love Christ you will "keep his commandments" one of which is here given: "Be filled with the Spirit."

Questions Answered

No questions will be answered unless the name and address of the one asking the question appears in the correspondence.

Q. What do you think of the "continued stories" in the Farm Journals, are they suitable reading for Christians?

A. Of course, there are various types of continued stories and there may be some that would be suitable reading for Christians; but the majority of continued stories in secular publications are "sex stories" and are so very trashy that they have a tendency to make those who read them trashy. These stories are full of illicit love affairs and unnatural social relations. They are not only harmful, but they are untrue to life—unless it is the life in the "underworld." Then there are others of these stories which are of "The Wild West" type and are a certain encouragement to crime. We have a tendency to become like the characters we read about, and these stories keep the mind engaged with illegitimate relations and sinful deeds to such an extent as to disqualify us for life in the "real world."

Q. Does prayer change the plan or mind of God? E. K., Kans.

A. Yes in this way: the threatened judgments of God are based upon conditions, and when those conditions change, the judgment is not carried out. For example, God threatened impenitent Nineveh with destruction, but when Nineveh repented, God spared it. This does not mean that God did not fully intend to carry out His original threat, but it does mean that the threat was conditioned upon the wickedness of the city and when this was changed, God withheld His judgment. In like manner, the blessings of God are promised upon certain conditions of which prayer and faith are often the principals, and so when these are fully carried out, the promised blessings come, but when they are neglected the blessings are withheld. God always "does His best" for us all; but God's best for one when he does not pray is not the same as God's best for that same person when he does pray. Yes, "Prayer changes things."

Q. What is the "sin unto death" mentioned in 1 John 5:16?

A. Three explanations of this "sin unto death" have been offered: (1) that it means a deed which is not just right (like eating too much, or not working as hard as we might) and yet which is not quite so un-Christian as to be accounted a proof that one is backslidden, hence *spiritually* dead; (2) that it refers to "sin against the Holy Ghost" which is "unpardonable"; (3) that it is a sin which exacts physical death as its penalty and that the thought is that it is useless to pray for people after they are dead. I incline toward the last explanation.

THE WORK OF THE WHOLE CHURCH

The General Board

AN IMPORTANT MESSAGE FROM GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT GOODWIN



We are pledged to the general plan as outlined by the General Board of the church. The General Assembly, with great confidence, placed the general financial interests of our church in the hands of this competent Board.

At their meeting in December they demonstrated their ability to grapple with every question and carefully considered all departments of the work. With the greatest care they eliminated all unnecessary expense and reduced the budget to its lowest possible minimum. Missions, home and foreign, together with the overhead expenses, including the allowance for the General Superintendents, compose nearly all the budget. Home and foreign missions are practically four-fifths of the entire budget. With great care they refused at this time to branch out and undertake work at home or abroad, even though the circumstances seemed to strenuously demand it. They felt they must ask for the least possible amount for the first year in establishing the budget system.

Feeling that it might take some little time for our people to fully grasp the better method of regular contributions, they decided to give time for the adoption of their well planned budget system. We believe all our people are anxious everywhere to eliminate unnecessary drives and that they are pronounced in their convictions that the budget plan is the most desirable and will prove a great blessing to the church. However, as has been stated, no plan will work itself. As we have repeatedly stated, the budget is only an estimate of the needs. The budget must be underwritten by every local church, together with their church expenses, to bring success.

The plan presupposes regularity in giving. Every church, every week, every month, should receive their contributions for the general interests of the church, these offerings gathered every week and month, sent to the District Treasurer and forwarded on to the General Treasurer of the Church. As will be clearly seen in the estimates of the General Board when they asked for \$260,000 for all general benevolences, the churches must contribute a little over \$20,000 a month. Of course, this is not a large sum for our many churches and 50,000 people, but it should and must come regularly to meet the needs, for our missionaries and workers must have their allowance each and every month.

We do not know exactly why there has been delay in receiving offerings from the churches. It may have been that the amount that each pastor was to raise seemed small

and thus they neglected it; or it may have been that the expectation was to raise the full amount later in the year and thus immediate offerings have been forgotten; or some may have been building new churches; others may have been giving attention to home mission work on their District while others may have been making an effort to meet past obligations.

The report of our General Treasurer, Rev. E. G. Anderson, was doubtless a great source of surprise and must have been also a cause of grief when we remember that we should have had in the three months over \$60,000 and we received only \$17,000. Nearly all of the \$60,000 had to be sent on to the field to supply the needs of the workers, thus again the Treasurer was compelled to borrow funds, paying interest, another great item of expense not included, nor provided for in the budget. It should be evident to all that this condition of things must not prevail. Funds must be immediately forth-coming from our churches or we must continue to drive for money or utterly fail.

It has been suggested that together with our Children's Day programs throughout the church it would be a splendid opportunity to gather funds for missions and for the general budget. Surely not later than June 15th the treasury must have thousands of dollars or the general interests of the church will be greatly crippled. We earnestly urge every loyal Nazarene to commence to pray and then pay. Let every pastor see that sufficient funds are raised and forwarded immediately. Our task is not a large one; the burden is not heavy if every Nazarene will do his best. We have this confidence that our people intend to stand by our missionaries and workers in the field. Now with a little extra effort in June we may be able to close the first half of the year, July 1st, without much of a deficit. Churches and pastors everywhere, let us awaken to this situation and do our best. I believe you will. God bless you.

OUR MISSION

THE Church of the Nazarene was undoubtedly called of God for such a time as this, a time when, not only the doctrines of the Church are assailed, but the fundamental truths of the Word of God, the Word itself being either explained away or contradicted and denied altogether, by men who pose as preachers of the gospel.

The mantle of early Methodism has fallen upon us. The great light of gospel truth—"Holiness unto the Lord"—has been committed to our care, which light *we must let shine*. God has shown us the darkening clouds of error and infidelity that are settling all about us; He has shown us the untold millions of unsaved heathen who in despair are holding out their hands to us practically saying "No one careth for my soul;" and He is offering to us scores of consecrated young

men and young women who are pleading to be sent to the foreign fields. Brother, sister, if you could be present at one meeting of our General Board, and hear the earnest request of consecrated men and women, to be sent to the fields, if you could hear their pathetic pleas and see the frequent tears in their eyes, it would stir you to the depths. Why such an earnest desire to go? Ah, God has shown them the distressing need and called them to go, not to a life of ease, not on a pleasure trip by any means, but to a life of great sacrifice and often much suffering.

But some one may answer that we already have a goodly number of missionaries in the field. To be sure we have. These must be fed and clothed, but *we must not let them suffer*. We have never permitted them to suffer, neither do we expect to now. But there is a great need at the present time and *we must pray*, and not only so, *we must back up our faith and prayers with WORKS*.

At our last General Assembly people seemed to feel that radical changes were necessary, that the custom of instituting "drives" to raise money to support the several interests of our work was not altogether the best way. Doubtless this is right, but the money must come in some way and we believe—in order that one may not be burdened and another eased—that the budget system is the best method of all, and every Nazarene ought to contribute. God will bless a single penny given in sacrifice more than a thousand dollars given out of an abundance, and the Holy Spirit will be grieved over a single penny withheld through pride or otherwise that ought to be given, as much as the withholding of the larger sums. If every Nazarene will come to the front, obey the teaching of God's Word and give voluntarily as God has prospered him, every financial interest of our church will be met and scores of workers can be let loose in home and foreign fields.

If we don't want drives we must come across with tithes and offerings. And isn't this the right way? "God loveth a cheerful giver." We have General Superintendents who are efficient and self-sacrificing and whose lives are far above the breath of suspicion. They adorn our church with a capstone of true godliness which we highly esteem; but we must not allow these men to suffer want or inconvenience by the change in raising our funds, or by our carelessness.

Nazarenes are the most liberal givers of any people we have ever known, but the radical change in method of raising funds, adopted by the last General Assembly and by the General Board elected to carry out the new plan, seems to have slowed up the machinery. And so *we must stir ourselves*. Therefore, we beseech you, District Superintendent, to stir up every pastor in your District to raise his apportioned part of the budget due at this

N. Y. P. S. TOPIC DISCUSSION FOR MAY 25

By STEPHEN S. WHITE

A Normal Response to a Great Vision

Isaiah 6:1-8.

I. INTRODUCTION.—Isaiah prophesied during the reigns of Uzziah, Jotham, Ahaz and Hezekiah, kings of Judah. "He seems to have belonged to a family of some rank, as may be inferred from his easy access to the king (Isa. 7:3), and his close intimacy with the priest" (Isa. 8:2). Isaiah was undoubtedly the greatest prophet of the Old Testament. He has been called the Paul of the Old Testament. He excelled all other prophets in spiritual and prophetic insight and in literary power. He advanced beyond the legalism of his day and proclaimed a spiritual religion, salvation by faith rather than by works. His book is filled with sublime passages, passages which are not surpassed by any others in all literature. He saw Christ in His humiliation (Isa. 53), in His glory (Isa. 35), and lived largely in the atmosphere of the New Testament.

II. THE VISION.—Isaiah had a vision of God. He saw beyond the many activities of this present

life. He saw beyond the forms of religion. His telescopic vision swept past all that is human and earthly and viewed the untarnished glory of the eternal God. If we would mount to the highest levels of religious privileges, we must come into contact with the great spiritual values and realities of the universe, that is, we must see God. The God that Isaiah beheld was a sovereign God. He was sitting upon a throne, high and lifted up. This fact had lately been demonstrated. King Uzziah had been suddenly stricken with leprosy while in the temple usurping the function of the priest. As he burned incense the sovereign God sent judgment upon him (2 Chron. 26:16-21). Isaiah also saw a holy God, a God who will not tolerate sin. By contrast his own uncleanness was revealed and that of his people. "I am a man of unclean lips." As soon as he recognized his condition and confessed it, God removed it. He who awakens to the state of sin within and is ready to admit his woeful plight is not far from the cleansing blood.

III. THE RESPONSE TO THE VISION.—After the vision of God and of himself, and the consequent cleansing, Isaiah heard the voice of God. The voice of the Lord spoke thus: "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" Isaiah answered as follows: "Here am I; send me." This is the prophet's great response to the wonderful vision. He quickly volunteered to serve in the army of the Lord. He did not wait until he was drafted. "He was ready to go immediately. Are we willing to go? The Lord is on the search for volunteers today. Can He depend upon us?"

IV. A NORMAL RESPONSE.—The prophet's words, "Here am I; send me," give to us the normal response. We would have expected him to answer as he did. He had seen the Lord, and to see Him, is to submit to Him, to consecrate ourselves to Him and His service. Paul met Christ in that marvelous vision on the road to Damascus and said to Him, "What wilt thou have me to do" (Acts 1:1-9). It was natural for him to respond thus to so unusual an experience. Isaiah's eyes were opened to his own need and the need of his people. The former need was met at once. Having been cleansed himself it would have been abnormal for him not to have desired to pass his blessing on to his people. They were a people of unclean lips and he must hasten to bear to them the message of divine relief. No Christian, much less one who had been made holy, could live in isolation when his brothers were in need. Getting to God awakens us to the fact that we are our brother's keeper. God said to Hudson Taylor, "I am going to evangelize inland China, and if you will walk with me, I will do it through you." It is no surprise that Hudson Taylor, a consecrated follower of Christ, accepted the challenge. It was the normal procedure for him. "Here am I; send me," does your heart respond thus? It should if you have ever seen God and your own sinfulness and have been cleansed from the latter. God bless you, and give you grace to be willing to be a volunteer for Jesus.

TOPICS FOR DISCUSSION

1. Describe the character and personality of Isaiah. 2. Discuss his work as a home missionary (Isa. 6:9-13). 3. Would Isaiah have consented as readily to be a foreign missionary? 4. Did King Uzziah's punishment have anything to do with Isaiah's vision and awakening? 5. What did Isaiah mean by speaking of himself as a man of unclean lips?

tion, with its historical predecessor, the Pentecostal Collegiate Institute, has already been represented on the missionary field by those who have spent something over two-thirds of a century in foreign service. In this we rejoice and pray for the day when scores more of our young people will be actively engaged in girdling the globe with full salvation.

We have had a great financial victory during the past year. Of course, the coming to us of Rev. J. C. Henson as business manager promises great things, and already God has enabled him to organize the forces of our District in such a way that an elimination of our indebtedness seems highly probable. Then again, we have reduced our mortgage by \$5,000 and have been enabled to liquidate many outstanding bills so that with the loyal support of the people of God of the Eastern Educational Zone, we have been able to maintain our credit and to meet the necessary bills as they arise.

The College Bible Department is constantly being strengthened. Professor E. E. Angell, who heads the department, is recognized as one of the strongest exponents of scriptural truths in the Eastern section of the Church of the Nazarene. Under his supervision we are now offering to our constituents four courses in Correspondence Bible work. A considerable number have already enrolled and we expect that by the opening of another school year this extension work will be greatly beneficial to those who cannot get to the College. Any who are interested should write to Professor Angell at once.

The College has two great problems to solve. The first is financial. Our burden of indebtedness must be lifted, and by the grace of God and the continued loyalty of our good people, it can be done in the near future. Everybody pray with us to this end.

The second problem is one of registration. We must double our enrolment at once. Anyone who has thought it over carefully along the line of the finances of holiness schools can not but know that it is absolutely necessary to run our institutions under full enrolment. Our tuition is so small that we must keep our student body at the maximum continually.

We are glad to represent the great work of the Church of the Nazarene in the eastern section of the United States. Here, under the eyes of Boston's

educational institutions, we are standing four-square not alone for the fundamental doctrines of the Scriptures, but for the peculiar vision and emphasis of the Church of the Nazarene. May we have your prayers that God's blessing may continually rest upon us.

NEWS NOTES AND COMMENTS

Census Bureau statistics issued recently estimate the country's wealth at the enormous sum of \$320,803,826,000.00 or \$2,918 per capita. Not such a bad showing for a country worrying along without intoxicating drinks for the past four years.

Rev. "Bob" Shuler, the "fighting parson" of Los Angeles, Calif. is publishing Bob Shuler's Magazine which now has a deserved circulation of over 10,000 copies monthly. "Bob" is a terror to weak-kneed officials, law breakers and the like. His magazine deserves 100,000 circulation.

It is said that more is expected of the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church now in session at Springfield, Mass. than any similar conference within the memory of living men. This great Conference of 800 men and women delegates meets during the entire month of May. The proceedings will be broadcasted by a powerful radio, the first time that such a thing has ever happened. All who have radios in the East or Central West "tune in."

Students representing eighty-five colleges and universities recently met at Washington, D. C. and passed strong resolutions calling for the enforcement of the Eighteenth Amendment. Immediately following a two days' session of this body, a group of remarkably strong women held a Woman's Law Enforcement Conference, with such influential leaders as Mrs. Herbert Hoover, Mrs. Charles E. Hughes, Mrs. Gifford Pinchot and Mrs. H. W. Peabody. The voice of this conference was emphatic for the enforcement of the Eighteenth Amendment and the Volstead Act. Any presidential candidate who expects the support of the women of this country must be "four square" on law enforcement.

The Epworth League of the Methodist Episcopal Church now has 800,000 members. It is closing one of the very best quadrenniums in its history. This vast body of young people are banded together for mutual helpfulness and intense Christian activity. We bid them God speed.

It is estimated that for a few weeks the foot and mouth disease cost the state of California \$500,000 a week. About 450 herds of cattle and hogs have been affected and over 50,000 have been destroyed. The disease has been checked and will soon be a thing of the past.

Harlan F. Stone the new attorney general and Curtis D. Wilbur the new secretary of the navy are both Christian gentlemen and as a matter of course demand the enforcement of all laws. The attorney general said, "There is nothing else quite so essential to the future of this republic as the enforcement of laws and respect for all laws." Secretary Wilbur said: "Lawyers who are retained in advance by criminal organizations of bootleggers, dope peddlers and panderers to defend clients for crimes not yet committed, are criminals and should be treated as such."

Life insurance people estimate that the people of the United States spend \$1,000,000,000 annually for hospitals, nurses, patent medicines, and doctors. These insurance companies also claim that another billion is lost annually through preventable sickness. A little care and cleanliness and much sickness could be prevented.

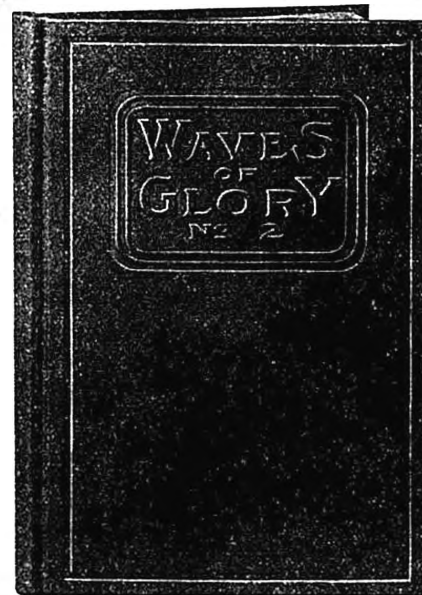

Review of New Books

THE DEEPER MEANING OF STEWARDSHIP. By John M. Versteeg. The Abingdon Press. 218 pages; price \$1.25.

The author claims that the revival of stewardship spells the survival of our faith and that future generations will arise to call us blessed for taking it to heart. It does seem that stewardship in all its phases is a subject that cannot be over-estimated or over-emphasized. Much has been written and spoken, in the past few years concerning stewardship. Mr. Versteeg feels that there are some deeper aspects of the subject which as yet have been touched but lightly if at all, and it is these phases of this vital question that he seeks to bring in this worthwhile book which should be read by every minister of the gospel and possibly by every layman, surely by every one who has not yet read with serious intent, a good book on stewardship.

THE UNIQUE HISTORICAL VALUE OF THE BOOK OF JONAH. By W. C. Stevens. Fleming H. Revell Co. 88 pages; price \$1.00.

An unusual book to be sure albeit worthy of study especially by the student of prophecy. The book as the title makes clear, does not dwell on the spiritual value of the book of Jonah which is readily discovered. The Universal and Personal Presence and Government of God in History is brought out; also the unflinching compassion of God to His creatures as shown in history, are salient points which alone would make the book of unquestioned value to Bible students.

HOME LETTERS FROM CHINA. By Gordon Potat. Geo. H. Doran Co. 159 pages; price \$1.50.

The story of how a missionary found and began his work in the heart of the Orient.
