NNC Invitational **Well Represented**

Eight track teams participated last Saturday in one of the best performances in NNC Invitational history. A total of nine records were broken with only eight being officially entered in the books due to a disqualification.

NNC Crusader, John Finkbeiner, finished with a powerful kick to clip more than four seconds from the old half mile mark of 2:03.1, out-distancing the field in a fine 1:58.7 clocking.

First place went to the powerful ISC Bengals with a total of 112 points. Second place to Ricks, Whitman, EDCE, Weber, C of I, NNC and BJC followed in that order.

Records toppled in the pole vault, mile run, two mile, 880 run, high hurdles, low hurdles, 220 yard dash, and the 440 yard run. The present record of 10 flat for the 100 yd. dash was tied and the mile relay time was not recorded as the winning teams were disqualified.

Our track team will be traveling to LaGrande this weekend to take part in the EOCE Invitational and as you leave, fellows, all the NNC students wish you the best of luck.

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
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The new NNC track field is shown here under construction. When completed it will have the widest track in Idaho.
