## Long-Range Expansion Program Is Planned

Ground-breaking ceremonies for a new fine arts building-the first building in what is expected to be a \$2,000,000, 10-year expansion program at Trevecca Nazarene College -will be held at noon Tuesday.

Ceremonies for the beginning of work on the \$120,000 arts structure are planned to coincide with the school's celebration of its 50th anniversary and its commencement program.

Dr. A. B. Mackey, president of Trevecca explained that the longrange expansion program calls for new dormitories, an infirmary and classroom buildings.


